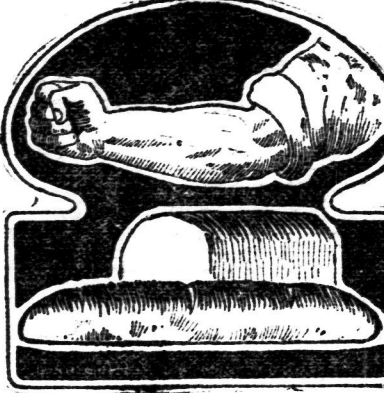

**Prevention of Tuberculosis.**  
Maps and charts are being used in the study of the prevention of tuberculosis. The Hygienic Nine, which consists of groups of nine, brought together for instruction in hygienic measures, are taking much interest in home methods, such as ventilation, cleanliness and diet. The lack of free bathing facilities is keenly felt, as a greater burden is placed on the lungs when the body is not ventilated. Compulsory notification will not become law, but in the meantime kindness and tact is doing much to bring to light hidden cases, both incipient and incurable. The next lesson will be given in West London.

## FOREST CITY WILL RETAIN THE CAMP

Goderich Is Hot After It But It Is Not Likely That It Will Be Moved.

## MAYOR GIVES OPINION

Mr. Cameron Really Believes That Goderich Will Get the Permanent Camp, But He Has Another Guess.

At local headquarters, it is stated, that there is absolutely nothing new regarding the location of the militia camp this year.

"The matter rests entirely with the officials at Ottawa," said an officer to The Advertiser today, "and we will not know where it will be held until we get word from them."

It is stated that Goderich is making a strong bid to secure the camp permanently. The general opinion, however, is that the camp will remain in London, as it is the more central point and can be held here far more economically than in Goderich.

When the camp was held at the latter place it cost the city a large sum of money for transportation, as the supplies had to be sent there and then brought back to London.

All the bread and provisions also had to be sent from here, and the officers complained very bitterly at the time of their bills for cab hire, as every time they wished to go into the town they had to drive three miles, and drive back. It is generally thought that the camp will be located in London.

## A Meeting in Goderich.

At a meeting of the town council held in Goderich on Friday night, Mayor Cameron stated that he had been in Ottawa recently, but had been unable to get any definite information regarding the location of the camp. He said the matter was still under consideration by General Otter and others, and he did not know where it would be held. It was the desire of the military authorities, in view of the visit of General Sir John French, to have the camp held in districts where there could be a good display, and as this is an important factor in the selection, we have, I think, a fair chance of getting it."

## KEPT IN STORAGE TO INCREASE PRICES

## Immense Quantity of Meat, Fish and Poultry Is Lying in Houses in Montreal.

Montreal, Que., March 19.—Inspectors S. Masterson and T. E. Grenier have finished their tour of the American cold storages, and today Dr. J. J. McCarrel, the chief inspector, prepared a report setting forth the conditions found to exist. This report shows that conditions are not quite as they should be. In the five cold storages inspected, 150 pounds of poultry were found, 300 pounds of pork, 800 pounds of beef, and 200 pounds of mutton. The heads of the houses stated that they could not tell how this meat had gone bad. None of it, they said, had been in storage for periods of more than a year. Of this Dr. McCarrel seems skeptical. He says he has been informed that much has been kept for two years.

Controller Ainey goes still further. He affirms that men working in the storage places have told him there are chickens there which came in over five years ago. With the idea of preventing the possibility of goods being kept so long, Dr. McCarrel intends to suggest the passing of a bylaw which will force managers of storage places to have all meat or produce left with them ticketed. The tickets would bear the date upon which the stuff was left, and would aid the inspectors greatly in determining the fitness of the food.

The inspectors made careful notes while making their rounds, and their report shows that at the present time the following goods are being kept: Poultry, 265,000 pounds; fish, 320,000 pounds; beef, 500,000 pounds; mutton, 146,000 pounds; lamb, 30,000 pounds; cheese, 100,000 pounds; butter, 60,000 pounds; maple sugar, 75,000 pounds. In addition, there are 300 boxes of oranges and 10,000 barrels of apples.

## Must Be Put a Stop To.

Controller Ainey, speaking of the matter today, said: "Those figures are awful. No wonder the price of living is going up. The workmen should take action. Why, look, he said, 500,000 pounds of beef, 250,000 pounds of poultry, 600,000 pounds of butter. Something should be done to stop this. It means the people are getting no change in the price of food. They are becoming a terrible evil. The people have no chance. Buyers from these cold storages go through the country in the summer, when the price of food is plentiful; and they buy up everything. It means prices are never low. These men can keep produce until it suits their convenience to sell; then people must pay a fancy price or do without it. The time was when we used to be able to get turkey at a reasonable price, but these cold storages have changed all that. I don't suppose they can do anything about it. I don't know whether the Legislature will; but these places only benefit the few at the expense of the many. They are the cause for much of the high cost of living. They should be inspected. Of course, in order to prevent bad food being sent out from them, but they should be made illegal. It's the only way."

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
