## FINED FOR ASSAULT

Men Who Attacked Grand Trunk Strike-Breaker Found Guilty.

Niagara Falls, Nov. 10.—John Quinn, Gordon Chandler, Russell Harper and Harry Smith appeared before Magistrate Fraser this morning, charged with assaulting B. H. Bratton, a G. T. R. strike-breaker, on Monday evening last. Bratton testified that the four young men jumped upon him, and Quinn caught hold of his coat and uttered vile language to him. The boys claimed they went to Bratton to find out why they had been discharged, and that Bratton pulled a knife on them. The magistrate imposed a fine of \$5 on Quinn, and allowed the other three to go with a lecture.

## HELP IS SCARCE

Lumbermen's Wages Will Be Higher Than Ever Before.

Winnipeg, Nov. 10.—The dearth of labor in Western Canada is being keenly felt by the lumbermen. As a result of this shortage, wages this winter will be considerably higher than ever before and will range from \$35 to \$40 a month and board. The usual rate has been \$25 to \$35 a month and board.

Employment agents say the shortage here is caused by the great number of men who were sent west to Alberta and British Columbia, to work on railway contracts. There is every indication that the lumbering operations both in the east and northwest will be on a large scale this winter, and it is of note that many camps will be established near the line of the Transcontinental Railway.

## TARIFF REFORM

Messrs. Pratt and Gagey to Take Part in Campaign.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—A. C. Pratt, M. P. for South Norfolk, and R. R. Gagey, M. P. for Manitoulin, will leave for England in a few days and take part in the campaign of tariff reform.

Mr. Pratt's purpose is to interest Englishmen of capital to invest in Canada. On a recent trip he motored through Kent and Gloucester and induced many settlers to come to Canada. As a result of his efforts two parties came to Canada, representing \$500,000 capital, which they were willing to invest in fruit lands. Some thousands of acres have been purchased in Norfolk County by English people for apple and fruit raising. As a protectionist, Mr. Pratt feels that he will be able to show the people of England something that will interest them. He is one of the most forceful speakers in the Legislature.

A. W. Wright, of Toronto, will also go to England. The three gentlemen go at the invitation of the British Tariff Reform League.

## GRUESOME EXHIBIT FAILED TO IMPRESS

Dead Men in Window Proved Useless for Election Purposes.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 10.—Corpses of two men who died from alcoholism were placed on exhibition in the windows of the undertaking establishment of the deputy coroner at Auburn, twenty miles south of Seattle, in an effort to win votes for the "drys" in the local option election held here Tuesday, but without apparent effect, for the town voted "wet."

Both factions were making a hard fight, and the prohibitionists appeared to be in the lead until late in the afternoon. Then the tide began to turn. In a frantic effort the anti-saloon leaders appealed to Deputy-Coroner Connell, an ardent prohibitionist, for aid.

He hurried to his establishment, where the bodies of the two men lay. Bolstering them in an upright position in their coffins, he placed them in the front windows. Above the heads of each a sign read: "He died of drink."

As voters hurried by the anti-saloon men directed their attention to the exhibition.

"There was no desecration of the dead," said Connell. "The men were without friends and their bodies might as well have been put to some use."

Philadelphians Will Play a Series of Games in Cuba.

Cincinnati, Nov. 10.—Business Manager Baeroff, of the Cincinnati Nationals, has signed a contract with Manager Jimenez, of the Havana, Cuba, team, to bring the Philadelphia Americans to Havana during the month of January, and play about 30 games with the Cuban team there. By the terms of the contract the fourteen men who will go are to receive \$500 each for the trip, making a total of \$7,000. In addition they are to have their expenses paid, and their wives also may go along without any additional expense to the players. In all twelve women will accompany the players.

## BROKE DOG BYLAW

Carrier Shipped Dogs Out of Quarantined District for Rabies.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—Henry Wood, mail carrier between Deabarton and Toronto, appeared in the police court this morning charged with breach of the animals diseases act, in having shipped dogs from a rabid-infected district to an uninfected. Two crates of hounds, one containing four and the other three animals, shipped by Wood were found almost suffocated on their arrival at Parry Sound.

Wood, through counsel, pleaded guilty and claimed he acted on behalf of others. A fine of \$50 and costs was imposed in each case. A summons has been issued against the Canadian Express Company for carrying the dogs, and a third charge is pending against a shipper in Blair, and it is said other charges will be preferred against hunters now in the north on their return.

## HEAVILY FINED

News Agent Who Robbed Foreigner on Train Found Guilty.

North Bay, Nov. 9.—John Mattson, an Austrian sub-contractor on the Transcontinental Railway, became acquainted with Samuel Fingel, train news vendor on the T. and N. O. Railway train coming from Cochrane on Sunday night, and a result was separated from \$350 and a watch he had just purchased from Fingel, together with a bottle of whiskey which Fingel charged him \$3 for. Mattson got drunk, and awoke at North Bay without money.

Provincial Constable McRae, to whom his tale was told, took the case in hand, and as a result of his inquiries had Fingel arrested when the train reached Bracebridge. Fingel's defence was that he won the money from Mattson playing cards. The latter denied this. Restitution was made and sentence suspended on the theft case, while Fingel was fined \$100 and costs for selling liquor on the train.

TWENTY-SIX FOUND GUILTY. Tokio, Nov. 10.—The finding of the special court organized for the purpose against the life of the emperor has just been announced. Twenty-six persons were found guilty, including the ring-leader, Kotoku and one woman, the wife of Kotoku.

The court recommends "the severest penalty under clause 73," which provides capital punishment for plotters against the imperial family.
