TABLETS TO THE GREAT
Unveiled in Edinburgh Castle, and
Given by Anonymous Donor.

Edinburgh, Scotland, July 31.—With
an entire absence of publicity, there
has been unveiled in Edinburgh Castle,
two tablets commemorating persons
who played important parts in
Scottish history three and a half cen-
turies ago. A tablet in memory of
Queen Mary of Guise or Lorraine, the
mother of Mary Queen of Scots, is
placed in the Crown Square beneath
the window of the apartment in which
the queen died in 1560. The other
tablet, fixed on the Forewell Battery
outside the Portcullis Gate, is to the
memory of Kirkaldy of Grange, who
was one of the earliest converts to
Protestantism in Scotland, and who
died on the scaffold in 1633.

The Lorraine tablet is oblong with
an ornamental molding, and the char-
acter of the design is early sixteenth
century Scottish. Cut in the stone is
the following inscription:
Mary of Lorraine, Queen of James
the Fifth, mother of Mary Queen of
Scots, and Regent of Scotland from
1560, died here, 11th June, 1560.
A lady of honorable conditions,
of singular judgment, full of humanity,
a great lover of justice, helpful to the
poor. Passed 1911.

The Kirkaldy of Grange tablet is in-
closed in a plain molding surmount-
ed by a smaller tablet bearing the
name of Kirkaldy. The inscription is
as follows:
"In memory of Sir William Kirkaldy
of Grange, justly reputed to be one
of the best soldiers and most accom-
plished cavaliers of his time." He
held this castle for Queen Mary from
May, 1568, to May, 1573, and after his
honorable surrender, suffered death
for devotion to her cause on 3rd August,
1573. Passed 1911.

Both tablets have been erected at
the instance of a donor who desires to
remain unknown. The designs were
submitted to the King, who approved
and sanctioned the execution of the
work.

MINISTERS' BLUNDERS
Paris Press Praises Wilhelm for Pacific
Intentions.

[Canadian Press.]
Paris, Aug. 1.—Paris newspapers in

be arrived at very soon.

WHITE TRYING TO
CLEAR HIS NAME
Man Whose Testimony Brought
on Lorimer Case Goes
on the Stand.

Washington, July 31.—Charles A.
White, who, after running the gamut
from street car conductor to member
of the Illinois Legislature, confessed
to receiving money to vote for Wil-
liam Lorimer for the United States
Senate, today began to retell his story
before the Senate Lorimer commit-
tee. He was the first witness in the
previous Lorimer investigation. His
examination is expected to consume
