

PASTOR BIGAMIST SOLEMN TRIFLER
Rev. John Horton's Papers Show He Moved to Chicago in July.

HE REPENTS AFTERWARD
Writes Note of Apology, Protesting That Attention Was "Pure and Holy."

Chicago, Oct. 12.—A solemn and serious trifler was the Rev. John Horton, of Beecher, Ill. At least he was so pointed in letters from here, there, and everywhere, which were collected yesterday to strengthen the charge of bigamy which has lodged him in the county jail at Joliet and threatens to move him into the penitentiary.

Before departing from Moody Institute to take his charge at Beecher, Mr. Horton appears to have had designs on a Chicago girl. A leaf from their correspondence was unearthed.

And there were other letters found in the minister's study which will be produced against him at his trial. The documents had been torn to small scraps. With them were pieces of a photograph. When fitted together these show the dark eyes of the Englishman whom Horton made his wife before coming to America.

Horton identifies photograph. "Why, I never thought anyone would find that," said he. "Yes, it's my wife as your man-made laws have it."

Among the letters was one addressed to Mrs. Fred Hunt, of Beecher, sister-in-law of Mrs. Horton No. 2. When the bits of mosaic were pieced out the letter read:

"Dear Mrs. Hunt: I do feel as if I would like to write and thank you for being so kind to my husband and making him so comfortable. It must be lonely for him amongst strangers, but it makes me feel more contented when he writes and tells me how kind you are. He mentions in every letter so I thought I would like to drop you a line of thanks for all your kindness to him, and for being so good to him. What you do for him you are doing for me, so we can be friends though the sea divides us. May the Lord richly bless you and yours in the sincerest wish of yours,"

Letter Refutes Preacher's Word.

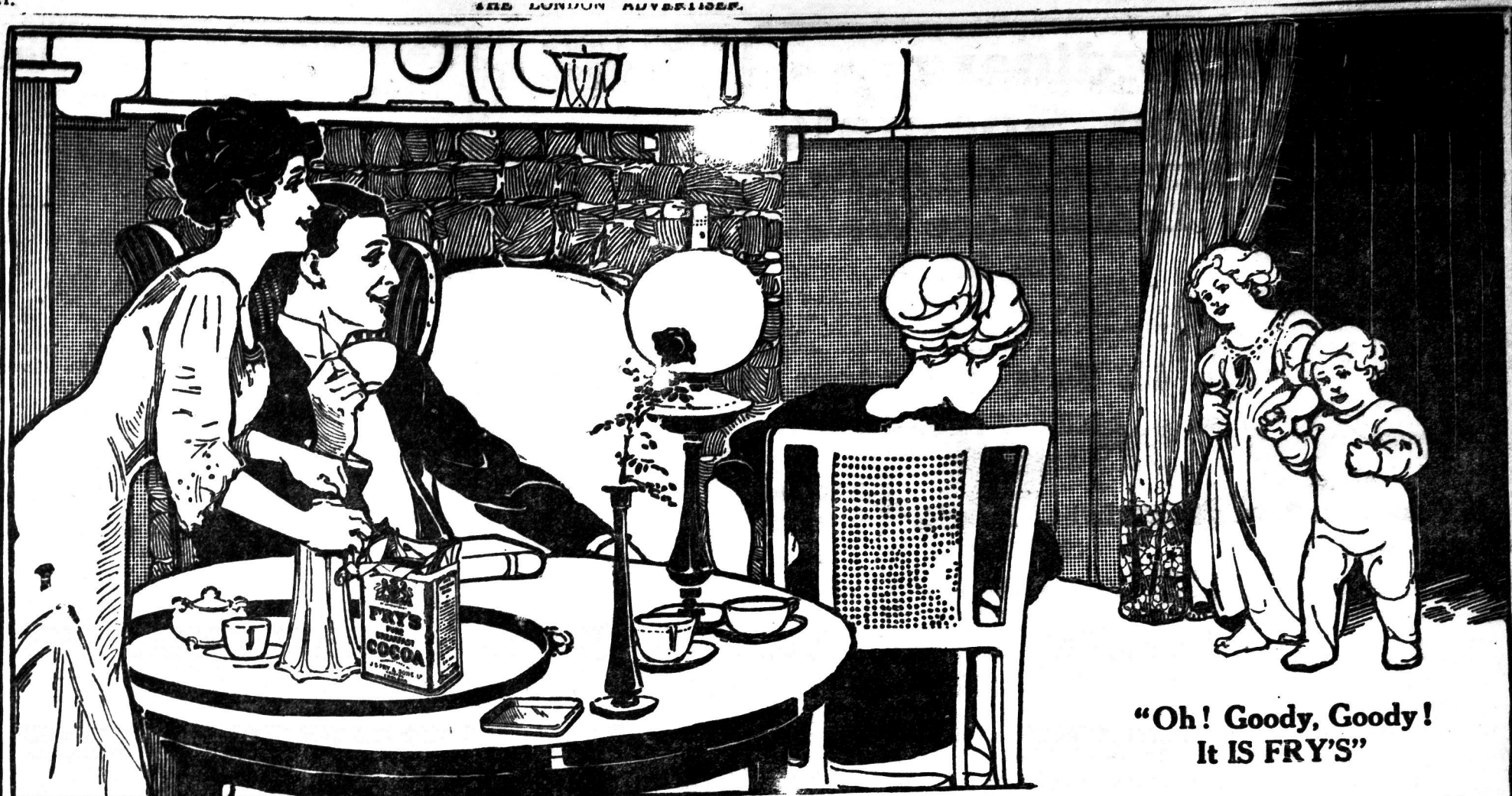

STEER ON BROADWAY KNOCKS DOWN MANY

Many Policemen Take Up Pursuit and Bullet Brings Animal Down.

New York, Oct. 12.—A wild steer carted along Broadway today and knocked over a score of pedestrians and upset several vehicles before it finally dropped dead with no less than sixty bullet holes in its tough hide. The animal escaped while being driven down the gangway from a car that had brought it from the stock yards in Chicago.

Broadway was filled with men and women going to work when the steer, shaking its big horns and bellowing with rage and fright, ran from Fifth street to Thirty-third street. Six policemen were in hot pursuit emptying their pistols as they ran, but none of the bullets found a vital spot until the animal turned over Thirty-third street and was about to invade the new Pennsylvania station on Seventh avenue. There it fell dead on a sidewalk in the midst of a crowd of commuters just leaving their trains.

Although at least twenty persons were upset by the animal in its wild career, nobody received anything worse than bruises. On its way the steer pulled to enter the car barns of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, where it butted over five motor-cars and forced the other employees to seek safety inside their cars. At Forty-ninth street a baker's wagon got in the way and in a jiffy the street was littered with fresh-baked rolls and bread. At Forty-second street the animal barged into a milk wagon and the milk and cream, dozing over for several hundred breakfasts, flooded the pavement.

By this time several hundred volunteers had joined the police in their pursuit and pistols popped incessantly. The bullet that finally brought the animal down struck it in the head.

COUNTERFEITERS WERE POSING AS HUNTERS

Lived in a Cabin in British Columbia and Made Rolls of "Queer."

Chicago, Oct. 12.—The decision of an expert in a local engraving concern, Capt. Thos. Porter, of the United States secret service, that the raid of Nootka Island, British Columbia, for counterfeiters' tools was not thorough. Relying on the belief that Albert Leon, arrested on Monday in New York, had perfected a photograph process for printing the spurious \$10 bills, no prolonged search was made for a printing press.

At about the time Leon was waiting examination yesterday and consenting to return to Chicago for trial under \$10,000 bail, the expert told Capt. Porter the bills had been made from a steel plate. It is believed the press is hidden in the woods near "Friendly Cove," the almost inaccessible place where Leon, Marneek, and Swanson are alleged to have made the money.
