Fire Victim Had Monster Funeral

Thirty-five Thousand People Fled To See Caskets.

Montreal, June 26.—The funerals of Patrick Hammill, Webster Molson, John Forsythe and Michael McDermott, the four firemen who lost their lives in the Itzweil and Sarazin sash factory fire on Sunday, took place this morning, services being held in both St. Paul's Church for the protestant and in St. James' Cathedral for the three Roman Catholic fire fighters.
A procession, composed of representatives of the fire and police departments, military, schools and social lodges in the city and fire departments of surrounding municipalities followed the caskets to the churches, the streets traversed being crowded with sympathetic citizens.

District Chief Latimer, with three men of the Ottawa fire brigade, arrived in Montreal last night to take part in the funeral.
Last night the lying-in-state was held, when 35,000 people filed by the caskets containing the remains in the central station. Archbishop Bruchest and two priests offered up prayers for the dead during the evening while kneeling before the bodies.
Diamond Lodge of the Orange Order, last night passed a resolution of sympathy with the "heroic men who had sacrificed their lives in the discharge of their duty."

Shot Wife Dead, Then Turned Gun on Self

Vernal, Utah, June 25.—Crazed with jealousy, while the sun danced, the greatest of the Ute Indian festivals, was in progress last night, Tim Inch, which shot and killed his squaw, and then fired a bullet into his own head. As the braves were dancing, Inch, which the squaw approached the pole around which they were holding their festivities, and placed a bundle of sticks at its foot. A young brave bent over, as if to take some of the sweets, greatly enraging Inch. The squaw noticed his anger and ran away. Inch, which followed and shot her dead. The Indian picked up his dead squaw, carried her to his tepee and then killed himself. Several white persons, witnessing the dance, became alarmed at the tragedy and hurriedly left the reservation, fearing that the Indians would rise against them.

Eight Killed by Premature Blast

Victims Are All Italian Laborers Engaged on Construction Work.

Kingston, June 26.—Eight Italians are dead eleven miles from Parham, near Sharbot Lake, as the result of a premature blast explosion on the C. P. R. construction work early today. Michael Guirey, an Italian, and ten of his fellow countrymen were engaged in the work when the explosion occurred. The bodies were found and five missing men are supposed to be somewhere in the debris.
Dr. W. W. Sanders, coroner, will hold an inquest this afternoon.

AN EVENTFUL PASSAGE

Immigrants Tell of Thrilling Experiences Aboard the Ascania.

Passengers of the Cunard liner Ascania, who arrived in London yesterday morning, experienced one of the most eventful passages from the old London to the new that have occurred in some time. According to their stories the last chapter in an eventful voyage was reached yesterday, when a Grand Trunk immigrant special was wrecked at Actonvale, Que. Four coaches of the train left the rails and toppled over. No one was seriously injured, but many were badly shaken up and bruised.

The Ascania was three days late in docking. Three times the big liner stopped on her way across the Atlantic. The first was for icebergs that threatened to combat the passage of the Cunardier. The next exciting chapter was when a passenger named Bond leaped overboard to his death. The third unusual stop was for a fight that broke out among the immigrants, following a duel between two foreigners, who were wielding huge knives. Some of the steerage passengers of the Ascania were tickled through to this city and are now in charge of Immigration Officer John Riggs.

No Beef Trust But Heavy Export Trade

Alarm Over Argentina Situation Is Not Justified, Says Senator.

Buenos Ayres, June 26.—Responding to an interpellation by Deputy Atencio in the chamber today the minister of agriculture made the statement that he had investigated the situation with reference to the meat industry, but was not able to say that a trust existed in Argentina, as opposed to the Anglo-Argentina meat establishment, although exportation by American plants established in this country had increased.

He declared that since January, 1912, there existed a combination of all the establishments, some of which, however, had opposed its renewal recently. He added that the managers of the American plants declared that the lowest price of Argentina beef in England was accidental and averred that there was no combination.

The minister expressed the opinion that to limit exportation would be legal and asserted that the alarm was not justified. He said that the British Government had intimated that Argentina check the beef monopoly, and Argentina asked the British to authorize the import of beef on the hoof after inspection by an English official at Argentina ports. The minister also urged the organization of a co-operative society among the cattle breeders.

Pat Glendon, the main character, is a young man with a clean, wholesome mind, and an enormous physique. He is taken to San Francisco, where he wins fame and laurels in bouts with other pugilists, and is accompanied by his father's request the crookedness of pugilism is concealed from him. Finally he hears of the trick, and he is disgusted with the trickery and cheating connected with the game, which he thought to be honest sport. Fighting becomes repugnant to him, he decides to renounce it and go back to the open, where he can breathe the fresh air of the woods, and accompanied by the girl he loves goes home again to his father, but not before he exposes to the public the crookedness of the game.

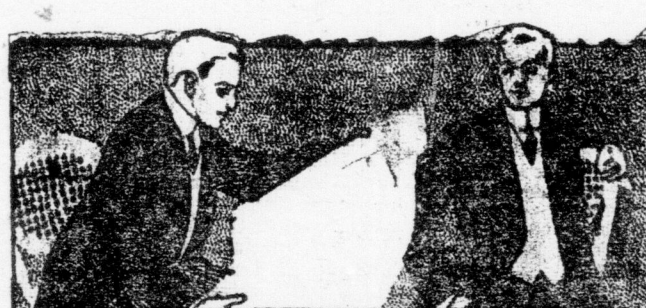
