GERMANY LINKED WITH "BUTCHER" TURK.

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United Press President Says American Peace Talk Amazes Belligerents.

MAY LAST FIVE YEARS But There Appears Little Chance of Ending This Year.

New York, May 3.—All Europe recognizes that the great war has developed something new in history—the siege of a nation—and has resolved itself into an endurance contest of the kind that has never before been known.

In 1915 is generally regarded as too remote for serious consideration. The position of the United States is a unique opportunity in the world's history to act the peacemaker—unless that opportunity is killed by ill-adviced and premature talk of peace at this time.

Visited Both Fronts.
The above is the belief of Roy W. Howard, president of the United Press, who returned to New York today after a three-months' tour of United Press bureaus and field points in England, Germany, Russia, France, Belgium and Italy.

During the tour, Howard visited the front and foremost trenches of both the German and the Allied armies, and made a number of observations of the conditions existing at the opening of the spring campaign.

Surprised at U. S. A.
"Belligerent and neutral in Europe have realized the life-national, commercial and social—the base of an indefinite war," he said. "They have eliminated every condition and consideration contingent upon peace."
