HOT WEATHER RULES FOR HORSE OWNERS

The following hot weather rules for rse owners have been issued by the London Humane Society:

1. Load lightly and drive slowly. 2. Stop in the shade if possible. 3. Water your horse as often as pos sible. So long as a horse is working, lows if he is going to stand still. Do

he has eaten his hay. 4. When he comes in after work, sponge off the harness marks and sweat, his eyes, his nose and mouth, and the dock. Wash his feet, but not his legs. 5. If the thermometer is 75 degrees or higher, wipe him all over with damp sponge, using vinegar water if

6. Saturday night, give a bran mash, lukewarm; and add a tablespoonful of saltpetre. Do not use a horse-hat, unless it is a canopy-top hat. The ordinary bellshaped hat does more harm than good

even a cloth, is good if kept wet. It dry it is worse than nothing. If the horse is overcome by heat get him into the shade, remove harness and bridle, wash out his mouth, sponge him all over, shower his legs, and give him two ounces of aromatic spirits of ammonia, or two ounces of sweet spirits of nitre, in a pint of water; or give him pint of coffee warm. Cool his head at once, using cold water, or, if neces-

sary, chopped ice, wrapped in a cloth 10. If the horse is off his feed, try im with two quarts of oats mixed with ran, and a little water; and add a little alt or sugar. Or give him oatmeal gruel or barley water to drink. 11. Watch your horse. If he stops

veating suddenly, or if he breathes hort and quick, or if his ears droop, or he stands with his legs braced sideays, he is in danger of a heat or sun stroke and needs attention at once. 12. If it is so hot that the horse sweats in the stable at night, tie him outside, with bedding under him. Unless he cools off during he night, he cannot well stand the next day's heat

London Boy, Who Dodged Bullets in Open, Wounded.

YPRES FIGHT WAS WORSE

Engagement of June 2nd Gave Pte. Chestnut Satisfaction of Seeing Huns Fall.

A. W. Chestnut, a former Londoner who was wounded late last month and is now recovering from shrapne wounds in the knees, in a British war hospital, graphically describes the action in which he fell, in writing to a London friend.

Pte. Chestnut joined a university reinforcing company that went overseas some time ago, and was wounded on June 29. In his letter he declares that he is making a speedy recovery, and the greatest trouble is from water on the knee that followed the wounding. In part his letter follows:

"I was wounded on the night of June 29, during a heavy bombardment. Our from early morning till dark without letup, but the Huns had failed to ana listening post some distance in front of our front line trench.

Finally we thought considering the meagre protection that the ditch offered, it would be safer to make a dash down the road for th front line trench. So up we got and down the road like a whirlwind broke We did not stop for the Ger man flares or anything. Shells were bursting in all directions, but some how we got through.

Bursting All Around. "Talk about 'cannons to right of them canons to the left of them' those shells were bursting in front, behind and on both sides of us.

"We arrived at the front line safely, and lay down on the firing step to wait for the bombardment to cease so we might start out for the post again. It was while lying here that a big p of shrapnel, from a high explosive shell, came over the parapet and hit me on the knee. However, it might have hit me on the head.
