> In connection with charges of extravagance, he held that Hon. G. H. Ferguson had not moved a single Ferguson had not moved a single amendment to any expenditure or objected to a single item on the floor of the House, but rather had held them to be niggardly. They had had some large expenditures, but if they followed the old system of bookkeeping could have shown a surplus of \$83,000, instead of a deficit. The deficit largely was caused by expenditure, over which they had no control, such as needed repairs

Grants to Schools.


