TORONTO, Feb, 17 .- The argu ments of Bishop M. F. Fallon of London regarding the constitutional rights of Roman Catholic schools in Ontario as propounded in a Massey Hall address here, were challenged today by W. D. McPherson, K.C., in a lengthy survey of the case in Cook's Church.

Mr. McPherson divided the sub ject under two headings, first the question of "Secondary Education," and, secondly, the question of "Apportionment of Taxation."




