N MOST countries it is a crime to commit suicide and anyone who tries it is liable to get into trouble with the police. But not so in all times and places. On the contrary, both suicide and murder have been considered very honorable in certain con-

For instance, suppose you are a Japanese gentleman of very high class and strong notions of personal honor. If you belong to the younger generation, possibly you might personally chastise the offender. But, if you are a gentleman of the old school you would proceed as follows:

You would announce to all of your friends that you had been insulted. Then you would call out a priest and tell him all about it. Then you would go home and write a letter to the insulter. This letter you would inclose in an envelope of lotus leaves. In it you would tell him that you considered yourself insulted and were about

to commit hari-kari. After this you get up on a platform and rip your vitals with a good sharp sword. If the man who insulted you is a gentleman he will go and do likewise. This clears everything up and everybody's honor is appeased.

THIS is not much different from the custom that prevailed in western civilization up till not so long ago. If one gentleman insulted another a challenge was issued and the two parties, accompanied by friends, met at dawn in some lonely place and proceeded

to attempt to kill one another with swords or pistols. While we in these days do not practice hari-kari, nor trial by ordeal, nor duelling, we are still dominated by the same idiotic reasoning. For what we have ceased to do as individuals, we continue to do as nations.

In order to settle a dispute between two nations, to determine a boundary line or wipe out an insult, anywhere from a thousand to a million men are recruited in each country, and they are led out into a fair field where they keep butchering one another until their respective countries are so bankrupt that they can buy no more powder.

This recruiting is done by flery speeches and brass bands, and nobody is considered noble or honorable that does not offer himself to have his inwards blown out, to prove that his country, whether right or wrong, could lick the other one.

As a gentleman in former times who would not fight a duel would be run out of town, so a nation in these times who would not

go to war would probably have to get off the earth. Pope Clement VIII. on one occasion declared that murders committed by several men fighting on each side were no less sinful than murder committed in single combat. This bit of common sense, however, has been entirely swallowed in the storm of mania that has over-run the earth.

Sir,-I noticed in the last issue of the Free Press of this town a refer ence to The London Advertiser, and also the statement that there has been a campaign of libel and mis-representation carried on here by the people against waterworks. We as citizens of Forest, have been shamefully slandered by this same paper of Forest. Even if we wished to carry on a libelous campaign, and we do not, we have no chance to do o, as no paper here is open to us. The reason the ratepayers are so strongly opposed to the move to put waterworks here is that we never had a case of sickness from bad water; also about ninety per cent are opposed to it, instead of a few

as the Free Press says. It is over two years since the so-called test was made, and there are none dead yet from drinking the water.

There are only about five hundred ratepayers in Forest, and we have always felt it is unjust to force a waterworks system here, because many of these ratepayers are widows


