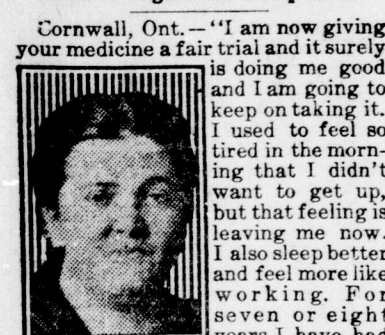

GASOLINE BLAST KILLS 2 SAILORS,

Explosion Occurred On Barge While Taking Cargo From Steamer.

LOSS IS \$700,000

Warrens, N. J., Nov. 17.—Two lives were lost, more than a dozen injured, two boats destroyed and docks along the Staten Island waterfront here were laid waste tonight when fire, resulting from an explosion of an oil barge, caused a loss estimated at \$700,000, including \$7,000 gallons of gasoline.

The blast occurred shortly after 6 o'clock aboard barge 44 of the Lambert Transportation Company of New York, which was taking on a load of barreled gasoline from the steamer William Boyce Thompson, owned by the Sinclair Navigation Company, also of New York, a subsidiary of the Sinclair Oil Company.

Both the ocean-going craft and the barge were destroyed by fire, which quickly enveloped the two boats, as well as the docks, destroying everything in its path.

ONTARIO LIBERALS WILL HOLD PARLEY

W. E. N. Sinclair Calls All Supporters To Toronto For Conference.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—Provincial Liberal Leader W. E. N. Sinclair has called a meeting of his supporters for Monday, November 24, in Toronto.

There will be a representative present from each of the 111 ridings in the province, and in addition, the Liberal members of the legislature will attend.

These delegates constitute the leader's advisory committee, and the meeting is called primarily for the discussion of organization work.

In the evening the delegates will be the guests of Mr. Sinclair at dinner, when he and Hon. Hal B. McGowan will be the chief speakers.

MODERATION LEAGUE MAY REVIVE MANITOBA ISSUE

Winnipeg, Nov. 18.—The executive of the Manitoba moderation league was instructed at the annual general meeting held here last night to consider the advisability of having legislation introduced at the next session of the provincial legislature which would provide for "the sale of beer by the glass."

F. W. Russell, president of the league, reviewed the results of the recent plebiscite in Ontario, declaring: "Prohibition is dead in Ontario. All live parts of the province voted overwhelmingly in favor of government control. The 'stagnant' parts of the province reversed the vote of the live and growing part. There will be some relief before long."

MILLING PLANT BURNED.

Glen Falls, N. Y., Nov. 18.—Fire last night totally destroyed the plant of the Vermont Milling Products company near Fair Haven, Vt., with an estimated loss of \$500,000, according to reports received here.

HOUSE OF POLICE CHIEF SURVIVES BOMB ATTACK

Grenade Is Hurlled at General William's Home in Toronto.

REVENGE IS MOTIVE

Police Believe Bootleggers Stirred by Drive Opened by Police.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—City and provincial police are engaged in investigating an attempt to wreck the home of Gen. Victor A. S. Williams, commissioner of the Ontario Provincial police, at 161 Spadina avenue, this city, with a bomb, but they admit they are puzzled.

Gen. Williams tonight pleaded that he be excused from giving any information on the matter as it might interfere with the investigation.

It is stated that Gen. Williams was in his home, when he heard a noise, and in going out into the yard found unmistakable evidence of the throwing of a hand grenade.

Police believe that the attempt to bomb the commissioner's home is a result of the general's announced intention of conducting a vigorous campaign against bootleggers.

Friday and Saturday of last week Gen. Williams headed a conference of the provincial police inspectors and O. T. A. enforcement officers at the parliament buildings, when it was decided to put on more men, use more motorcycles and better motor cars; in short, vigorously to attack the bootlegging gangs operated in this province.

A city policeman on duty in the neighborhood was one of those who heard the explosion and accompanied Gen. Williams on a search of the vicinity.

MAN DROWNS IN RIVER WHILE DUCK-HUNTING

Wilbert Follick, St. Thomas, Dies as Boat Upsets Near Detroit.

St. Thomas, Nov. 17.—Wilbert Follick, son of W. H. Follick, 20 Mabel street, was drowned in the St. Clair river on Sunday while duck shooting, according to word received here today.

This is the third death in the Follick family in a few months. Mrs. Follick having died recently and a son-in-law died in Detroit less than a month ago.

Wilbert Follick was an inspector in the tool department of the Ford Motor Company at Detroit, and with a companion went duck shooting on Sunday afternoon near St. Clair flats. The boat overturned, and the companion managed to swim ashore, but Follick went down. The body has not yet been recovered. Follick is survived by his widow, who is in delicate health, one son and one daughter, aged 7 and 5. He was 33 years of age, and had been resident in Detroit for some years.

The father has gone to Detroit, and when the body is recovered the funeral will be held here.

LEADER OF FARMERS PREMIER OF VICTORIA

J. Allan Becomes Fourth Prime Minister in Four Months.

Melbourne, Australia, Nov. 17.—J. Allan, leader of the farmers' party, is now in the saddle as premier of Victoria, and he has included in his cabinet the second last premier of Victoria, Sir Alexander Peacock, as treasurer.

Changes in the Victorian government have been kaleidoscopic. In a little more than four months there have been four premiers of the state. It is just a little over four months since H. S. W. Lawson was overthrown on a non-confidence motion in his government. Premier Lawson was succeeded by Sir Alexander Peacock as premier.

Then a few weeks ago Sir Alexander Peacock followed his predecessor on a similar motion, and G. M. Prendergast, labor leader, stepped into Peacock's shoes as premier of Victoria. Last week Prendergast went the way the two previous premiers had gone, a non-confidence motion moved by J. Allan, resulting in Prendergast's downfall.

SWANS BREAK CUSTOM AND VISIT JACK MINER

Jack Miner's bird sanctuary at Kingsville was the calling place recently of a flock of about 200 native white swans on their way south for the winter.

The manoeuvres of these birds on Lake Erie, near the Miner farm, were witnessed by many bird lovers. White swans in their wild state were almost extinct in Canada a few years ago, but a large flock regularly makes the sanctuary a port of call. This is in the spring when they are going north, for they seldom visit the farm on their way south in the fall.

It is thought the unusually mild weather, combined with the not-to-be-forgotten table board at Jack Miner's place, induced this detachment to drop for a day or two on an autumnal surprise party.

Wild swans have been seen at Port Stanley flying south across the lake to the southern states, but these birds do not land. The flock was exceptionally large.

LONDON CHAMBER OPENS CAMPAIGN

Drive Started This Morning. Under Leadership of President Dowler.

LASTS TWO DAYS

Fifty members of the London Chamber of Commerce started out this morning on a concentrated two-day drive for new members under the leadership of President R. H. Dowler and ten team captains, and it is quite safe to say that the drive will be most successful.

Inspiring addresses as to the work the chamber had accomplished in the past and what it hoped to do in the future were delivered at a dinner last night in the Tecumseh House by President Dowler, Col. W. J. Brown and Tom Yull, president of the Kiwanis club.

Col. Brown spoke at some length, reviewing in detail the work of the chamber in connection with Western University, and told the force for good that the chamber embodied "Go out with enthusiasm," Mr. Yull told the team members "We have something better to sell than we had last year. A snappy two-day campaign will bring the membership up to 800 where it should be," declared Mr. Yull amid terrific applause.

Send Out Letters.

President Dowler stated that each prospective member had been sent two letters, one from Major Gordon Ingram, past president of the chamber, and one from the chamber itself, outlining the work accomplished.

A telegram from the St. Thomas Chamber of Commerce reciprocating the good wishes of the London C. C. was read by President Dowler, who explained that St. Thomas was one on the eve of a membership drive.

The Lions club orchestra under the direction of R. V. Hodgins rendered a program, and after the dinner, while the stories told by B. A. McDonald received a hearty reception.

Lists of prospects were passed from one captain to another until all the names were initiated.

TORIES ORGANIZE NEW ASSOCIATION

Party Leaders Chosen at Toronto Convention—Meighen Named President.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—The Liberal-Conservative Association of Canada was formed today at a conference of representatives from provincial Conservative organizations in all but New Brunswick of the nine provinces of the dominion, assembled here at the invitation of the Ontario Conservatives.

Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen was elected honorary president and was enthusiastically endorsed as party leader. J. R. MacNicol of Toronto was elected president; J. A. Lamont of Montreal secretary, and Hon. Robert Rogers of Winnipeg, treasurer.

The latter tried to decline the nomination, but the gathering drowned out his protest with cries of "Good Old Bob." And no other name being advanced for the post, Mr. MacNicol, as chairman, refused to permit Mr. Rogers to decline. The latter said that he was doubtful if he could fill the post but whether he was the active treasurer of the organization or not, he would promise his best efforts for its success.

GOMPERS PREDICTS HIS RETIREMENT SOON

U. S. Labor Leader Warns Federation Against Dangers of Compulsion.

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 18.—Samuel Gompers, opening the forty-fourth annual convention of the American Federation of Labor today, notified the delegates that the time is not far distant when he must cease to function as president of the organization.

Mr. Gompers' notice that his retirement might come before long, which William Green read to the convention at Mr. Gompers' request, was accompanied by a plea for peace within the ranks, and warning against the inherent danger of the federation attempting to impose its will by compulsion on any of its members.

The document began with a brief history of the federation, and its success as a purely voluntary body. "Where we have blundered into trying to force a policy or decision, even though wise and right," it went on, "we have impeded, if not interrupted, the realization of our aims."

"No lasting gain has ever come from compulsion. We seek force we tear apart that which united is invincible."

CHURCH PRESENTS SPLENDID CONCERT

St. Andrew's Choir Gives Fine Program as First of Season.

St. Andrew's church choir kept faith with its audience last night and presented a program which was of the finest type. Mrs. Charles Ivey of this city and Miss Agnes Adie of Toronto rendered violin and vocal numbers which lent pleasing variety to the program, the background of which was made up of splendid choral numbers. Charles E. Wheeler, choir-master, led the different sections of the chorus through the difficult passages of the evening with ease and finish.

Although applause was barred by a head-note on the program sheet, the listeners broke the rule following the first violin number by Mrs. Charles Ivey, who was undoubtedly the favorite artist of the evening. Mrs. Ivey was first heard in Handel's "Sonata," Op. 44, which she played with brilliancy and feeling. Mrs. Ivey's work on the violin has achieved an important place in London, although she plays only too infrequently.

Mrs. Ivey was heard again in a delightful group including "A Swing Song" by Ethel Barnes, "On Wings of Song" by Mendelssohn and "Caprice Viennois" by Kreisler. Temperament and artistry were found in her playing here, the Kreisler number coming as a brilliant conclusion to her share on the evening's program.

Mrs. Harris Elliott at the piano was a most adequate accompanist. The visiting artist, Miss Agnes Adie, has a soprano voice of clear, musical quality which appeared to advantage in the Handel number, "My World," and Mascheroni's "For All Eternity," sung with violin obligato. Miss Adie has a strong dramatic sense and sings with fervor and strength.

She won her audience early in the evening with the Costa number "I Will Extol Thee" from "Eli," and held their interest and their admiration until she had sung the final notes of the aria from La Boheme which concluded the evening. She sings as if she threw her whole personality into her songs and she conveys her enthusiasm to her audience.

The La Boheme number was followed by "Yesterday and Today," by Gilbert Spross. Her program also included Mascagni's "Ave Maria," sung with violin obligato.

The choir was in splendid voice for the concert, singing with precision and well-brought-out tone. The different sections were responsive to the leader, Charles E. Wheeler, who handled them with sympathy for artistic results.

The opening number of the evening was F. Hillier's "Praise the Lord for His Great Wonders," from "The Song of Victory." Miss Eula Kennedy acted as soloist. In the next selection, the magnificent F. H. Cowan number, "He Giveth His Beloved Sleep," Mrs. Robert Durst took the solo part. The choir's program was completed by two part songs, "Call of the Breeze" (Cliffe Forrester) and "A Spring Song" (Cliffe Forrester), both beautifully rendered.

The concert, coming as the first of the winter season, has set a high standard for church concerts.

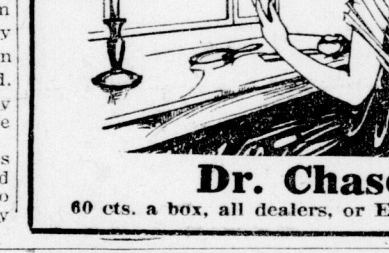
