W.C.A. WILL UNVEIL TABLET ON GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

Aged People's Home Will Be Scene of Interesting Public Ceremony.

CHARTER MEMBERS

The celebration of the 50th anniversary of the founding of the women's christian association of this city will be an important event of next month. This organization has now in its care the Aged People's Home in London North, and the Victoria Home for Incurables in South London, and has had the supervision of these institutions for the past half a century. For a time the infants Home in North London came under the care of this organization, which has always included in its membership some of the most influential women of the city.

The golden anniversary of the founding of the society will be marked by a public unveiling of a tablet bearing the names of the ten charter members of the organization. This ceremony will take place at the Aged People's Home on March 16, and will probably be characterized by addresses from civic officials and other public personages. Final arrangements for the event will be made at next Wednesday's meeting of the association.

The ten women, who signed the application for act of incorporation of the association 50 years ago, and whose names will appear on the tablet to be unveiled, are none of them now living. Mrs. Thomas, who was the first president, and who died only last year, outlived the rest who are as follows: Mrs. J. J. Lancaster, Mrs. John Ingram, Mrs. Newcombe, Mrs. George Webster, Mrs. Smiley, Mrs. Ward, Mrs. J. H. Flock, Mrs. Wm. Glass, and Mrs. Parker.

ANGLICAN W. A.'S TO GIVE PAGEANT

Junior Women's Auxiliaries Will Present Story of Mission Work on March 25.

In connection with the missionary work of the Anglican churches of the city, a delightful missionary pageant is being presented by the junior women's auxiliaries in Croydon hall on March 25.

The work of the production has been distributed among the different churches in the city, and each of the six branches will have charge of one scene. The churches taking part will include St. John the Evangelist, Croydon Memorial, Christ church, St. Paul's, St. Matthew's and St. George's. The pageant is a difficult undertaking, but, under the capable directorship of Miss Jean Waugh, assisted by the leaders in the various churches, it is sure to be a success. It will also give people a chance to see what the Anglican churches are doing and the great work will be better understood by the majority of persons after the presentation.

The pageant is divided into six clever scenes. It opens with a Canadian background, and in this introduction the work among the white settlers in the west—that is, those on the prairies, who are far away from any church—is clearly depicted. Following the Canadian scene, the audience will be taken across the broad Pacific to Japan, where one will have a peep into the kindergarten work done among the Japanese children. Then back to Canada again, where the wonderful work being done in the Indian boarding school will be explained. Then the audience will go back across the ocean once more to India, and in this scene the great need of medical missionaries will be outlined. Once more there will be a Canadian scene, in which the work among the Eskimos will be featured, and then the beautiful pageant will close with China, where evangelistic work is being done.

London fell in line with the rest of the women of the continent yesterday in holding a day of intercession in the interest of missions throughout the world. Hundreds of London women gathered at the various prayer centers throughout the city in the afternoon. The prayer meetings were interdenominational. Anglican, Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, Congregationalist and members of Christian church, Latter Day Saints, Mission church and Salvation army, all uniting in one great hour of intercession.
