FREDERICTON SHOWS

THE CLOVEN HOOF
Malicious and False Statements
Being Circulated in Revenge
for the Big Beating Here

The following news item has been largely copied by the press throughout the Maritime provinces:

"Elmer Ferguson, writing on The Montreal Herald, has the following:

"Hockey as it is in the eastern provinces is a joyous pastime. Police on the ice, arrests, imperfections, and flat fights are all part of the game. But here's the newest one. The Fredericton team went over to Campbellton, a little north shore town, to play in the New Brunswick League series. The troupe arrived at four o'clock in the morning, and at that unearthly hour were unable to get hotel accommodations. The players and supporters walked the streets all night with the thermometer registering between 30 and 40 below zero. Mike Murphy, a player, and Trainer Jones endeavored to get into the police station for the night, but they could not wake the policeman up. Murphy froze both ears, and others of the party were badly frost bitten. The team was beaten at night."

In addition to this a long article has appeared in the Fredericton Glenmer, making many malicious and false representations regarding Campbellton, all of which has appeared in print because Fredericton with its team of "bullies and bums" were not able to defeat Campbellton at hockey, and have made a show of themselves by the poorest display of sportsmanship ever yet exhibited.

Apart from the hockey stand point these articles are reflections on the town of Campbellton which no citizen will allow to go unchallenged. It is an insult to the town and its people.

TRAFFIC LESS

THAN LAST YEAR
Hon. Mr. Cochrane Explains
Discontinuance of Ocean
Steamers

Ottawa, Feb. 17.—In the house of Commons yesterday, in reply to a question from Mr. Emmerson as to reasons for discontinuing the Ocean Limited, Hon. Frank Cochrane said that the train had been run last year throughout the winter at a very great loss. The traffic was less this year than last and therefore the department had come to the conclusion that it was not in the interests of the road to run the train. Moreover, the I. C. R. was short of rolling stock and if the Ocean Limited were continued throughout the winter, there would be no opportunity to clean up and put the cars in good condition for next year's traffic.

In reference to other trains, the Minister intimated that he would take off the Southern Empire between Windsor and Halifax and the express between Halifax and Bedford, leaving no trains running on these lines. One train would be taken off between St. John and Hampton. One train between Point du Chene and Paines. One train between Campbellton and St. Mary's. One train between Fredericton and St. John. One train between St. John and Lunenburg and Dartmouth.

In an editorial note the Transcript says:

"Mr. Cochrane, as Minister of Railways, ought to have the sincerest sympathy of the general public. Above, he announces that one train will be taken off between Paines and Point du Chene, but as a matter of fact, two were put on on Monday. Who is running the railway anyway, Mr. Gutelius or Mr. Cochrane? Neither one of them seems to know much about it."
