"If the statements made by Mr. Henry George, in his letter of August 28, filed at Washington on Saturday by his connsel, is correct they certainly present a case for the immediate and careful attention of the government. The United States concedes to Great Britain the right to enact and enforce such laws as are necessary for the preservation of peace and order in her borders, but it has a clear right to ask that these laws be carried out in a fair and friendly spirit, and that American citizens shall have at least the same treatment as would be accorded citizens of Great Britain in in this country.
