


IT IS A RADIAPHONENOW

SPEECH TRANSMITTED THROUGH SPACE BY MEANS OF LIGHT.

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WENT AGAINST THE COMPANY.

A Jury Assesses the Toronto Railway Company for \$1100.

Mr. Laidlaw exhausted his powers of oratory on the jury in Gossell against the Toronto Street Railway yesterday at the Assize Court for damages received by the plaintiff by being tumbled out of his cart by a trolley car.

On the 25th of last April Mr. Edward Gossell of 38 Wilton-avenue was driving a load of coal down Yonge-street. When near Scollard-street and while in the act of turning off the tracks his vehicle was struck by a motor car.

The wheel which was torn off the wagon was trundled into the court room by Mr. Fullerton, the counsel for the plaintiff.

Mr. Laidlaw objected to the rate of speed on an element in the case, when Mr. Fullerton volunteered the remark that the car was going 25 miles an hour.

Defendants counsel also drew the attention of the court to the fact that the car had the right-of-way, and vehicles must not obstruct.

The injured man is 55 years old. Dr. Robert W. Bell and Allan B. Cook said that Gossell's arm was irretrievably injured.

Benjamin Robertson, a grocer, thought the motor car was floating, as it was going so fast. It was going in his opinion, not less than 20 miles an hour.

A number of witnesses testified as to the speed of the car. Mr. George W. Prittle said the gong rang only once.

Mr. Laidlaw argued for a non suit on the contention of the law in the matter. He said that the rate of running at a high rate of speed is not a violation of any statutory law, in the common law governing the right of way.

Alleged Excessive Assessment. Silas James, City Assessor, was committed for trial by the Police Magistrate yesterday on a charge of having made an unjust and fraudulent assessment on 51 acres belonging to John Mills on the south side of Danforth-avenue.

The property is assessed at \$3500 per acre and Mills claims that \$1000 per acre would be a fair valuation. He put Messrs. W. Dickson, John Russell and J. A. Nesbitt in the box, all of whom testified that \$1000 was a fair valuation.

In his defence Mr. James claimed that the Mills property had three good frontages, a fact which he had discovered since the previous assessment, and this explained the reason he had increased it.

BUSINESS ON THE EXCHANGES

THE BULLS CONTINUE TO HAVE THE REIGN OF IT.

A Little More Activity in the Local Wheat Market—Bank Clearings Are Comparatively Small—Wall-Street Firmly Sustained by Washington Advice.

Canadian Pacific closed 1/4 better in London today at 75 1/2.

Consols are 1/16 weaker, closing at 95 1/2 for money and account.

Richelles and Ontario is higher today.

Sweeping reductions have been made in passenger rates from Glasgow to three points to point on the Pacific Coast.

The Bank of England directors met today, but made no change in the minimum discount rate, which is 3 per cent. A year ago the same rate was 4 1/2 per cent.

It is said that Hiram Walker will continue the London & Port Stanley Railway to Buffalo and will in the western connection of the Lakes.

A report from the Treasury Department at Washington, filed before the Senate yesterday, shows that the revenue for the first three months of present fiscal year of over \$11,000,000.

Senator Quay has announced his intention of proposing a new amendment to the repeal bill the effect of which would be to take effect until Jan. 1, 1894.
