Lord Monk Dead.

HE WAS GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF CANADA DURING THE TROUBLED TIMES.

London, Nov. 30.—The Times this morning announces the death of Viscount Monk, former Governor of the United Provinces of Canada.

Charles Stanley, fourth Viscount Monk, who was Governor-General of Canada when the scheme of Confederation was carried into effect, was born at Templemore, in the County of Tipperary, Ireland, on Oct. 10, 1818.

He was the fourth Viscount, and the eldest son of Charles Joseph Kelly, third Viscount Monk, who died on April 30, 1849.

His mother was Bridget, youngest daughter of John Willington, of Kilkenny, in the County of Tipperary, Ireland. He received his education at Trinity College, Dublin.

After leaving college he studied law, and was called to an Irish Bar at the Kings Inns in 1841.

In the month of May, 1848, he was an unsuccessful candidate for the representation of the County of Wick in the House of Commons.

He succeeded to the family title and entered upon the death of his father, on the date previously indicated. In February, 1851, he was appointed a commissioner of crown lands and forests in Ireland.
