REPORT OF SUPT. OF EDUCATION

The annual report of the Superintendent, tabled in the House of Assembly, showed a general advance beyond previous records. During the year the schools increased from 2,835 to 2,898, an addition of 63; and they averaged 192.1 days in session against 186.4 days the previous year. The enrollment of pupils increased from 108,696 to 109,483, an addition of 787; while the total days attendance of pupils rose from 13,221,961 to 14,658,494, a total increase of 1,436,533 days.

The increase in the Common School grades was 1,173, and in the High School grades 214. The number who desired to test their scholarship by writing the Provincial School Examinations was 7,657, as compared with 6,682 of the previous year. The number of pupils daily present at school during the year was 73,238, as against 66,441 the previous year. The percentage of those enrolled in daily attendance, 66.9, was also the best in the history of the Province. The number of sections without schools was 13 less than the previous year. They still number 114; but a large number of these are decayed sections having no children of school age. Another large part of this group has only a few school children who attend school in the neighboring sections. This leaves very few sections with children who have no school to attend—some due to the accidental loss of the school building during the previous year. There are, every year, however, in about one half of the counties, one, two or more sections which fail to have school on account of other local conditions or the inactivity or feuds of the residents.

LOCAL HAPPENINGS

Provincial Parliament concluded its sessions on Saturday last.

There was a large attendance of officers and members of Crescent Lodge, I.O.O.F., on Thursday night and the first and second degrees were exemplified.

The last issue of the Royal Gazette contains the notice of appointment as a Commissioner under Section 1 of Chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1900,—of Edmund Clay Hall, of Bridgetown, in the County of Annapolis.

Fishing from the Bay of Fundy ports has been very considerably retarded by the rough weather. Lobsters have been coming very scantily into the local market. Rough weather and scarcity of bait are among the causes attributed.

Harbor revenue at the port of St. John for March was higher than ever in the history of the port, totalling about \$21,000, or more than \$4,000 greater than during the same month last year. The previous high record was \$20,000, collected during one of the war-time months.

Fifteen years ago L. R. Fairn, of Aylesford, drew the plans for a \$101,000 school in Sussex, N.B. This school was destroyed a short time ago by fire. Plans were called for a new school, and L. R. Fairn's design was accepted by the Sussex trustees. This building when completed will cost in the neighborhood of \$160,000.

Mr. J. E. Lloyd, the popular and respected Town Clerk of Bridgetown, on Monday reached his seventy-fifth birthday and was warmly congratulated by his friends. Mr. Lloyd is still very active and a much more efficient official than many a man much younger. His many friends, including THE MONITOR Management, wish him health and strength to enjoy years of active and useful service.

Mr. Wambolt, formerly owner of the Palace Theatre, Sydney, has purchased the Arthur Bent place at West Paradise. Mr. Raymond Leslie, of River Hebert, Cumberland County, purchased M. Wentzell's farm at Upper Granville and I. S. Higgins, proprietor of the Richmond Dairy, Halifax, has purchased the farm of Mrs. William Spurr, Clarence. The above sales were made through Mr. V. A. A most remarkable result in a town of this size and a splendid tribute to the unflagging energies of the pastor, Rev. Clyde W. Robbins and his energetic co-workers.

The ordinance of baptism was administered to six candidates on Sunday evening at the Baptist Church by the pastor, Rev. Clyde Robbins.

Chief of Police George Gill, of Yarmouth, was a visitor in town Monday en route to Kentville. Mr. Gill was a year or so ago was police officer at Bridgetown and received a warm welcome from his many friends.

The banquet which the Ladies Class tendered the Brotherhood as the result of losing out in the membership competition for the first quarter of the year will take place on the evening of May 23rd and will be the biggest affair of the kind ever held in Bridgetown.

Middleton is making a drive for \$1,000 for their Band to purchase new instruments and to increase its efficiency generally. Middleton is to be commended highly. A first class band is a splendid asset to any town and always worthy of more support than usually accorded.

The annual meeting of the Board of School Commissioners for the District of Annapolis West will meet in the Court House, Annapolis, Wednesday, May 10th, at 2 p.m. The Annapolis East Board will convene in the Agricultural Building, Lawrencetown, Saturday, May 13th, at 2 p.m.
