On Monday 7th inst. the following Address was presented to His Excellency the Governor in Chief.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable GUY LORD DORCHESTER, Captain General and Governor in Chief of the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and their Dependencies, Vice Admiral of the same, General and Commander in Chief of all His Majesty's Forces in the said Provinces, and the Island of Newfoundland, &c. &c. &c.

May it please Your Lordship,

WE the Inhabitants of the City and Banlieu of Montreal, beg leave humbly to present our most sincere Congratulations upon the safe arrival of Your Lordship and Family in this Province.

Your Lordship's long residence in this Colony, Your intimate knowledge of its Interests, and your constant desire, during the whole course of Your Government, to promote whatever might be conducive to its prosperity, are the best proofs which we can receive of His Majesty's paternal regard for His faithful Subjects in this remote quarter of His Dominions.

We further humbly beg leave to offer to Your Lordship our most sincere wishes for Your Health and domestic Happiness, and that You may long exercise Your mild and equitable Government over these Colonies.
