 Fishermen using lead-shot-type sinkers and anyone having possession of an empty shell casing will require a firearms licence - Sec 82 (1)

Mr. Basford stated before your Committee, "this borders upon being a frivolous debating point. Surely nobody can seriously argue that a lead-shot-type sinker is primarily useful as a component, element or part of ammunition." We ask, does not section 82 (1) state: "for the purpose of this part?"

"Ammunition" means ammunition for a firearm and includes any component or part such as a bullet, <u>pellet</u>, <u>cartridge case</u>, primer or propellant powder useful as a component, element or part of ammunition.?

Does not section 88 (1) state: "Everyone who, not being the holder of a licence under which he may lawfully have in his possession firearms or ammunition, knowingly has in his possession any firearms or ammunition."

 (a) is guilty of an indicatable offence and is liable to imprisonment for two years or:

(b) is guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction?

Did not the Canadian Sporting Arms and Ammunition Association in their testimony before you on April 29th indicate quite clearly that the same bullets and buckshot pellets they manufacture for their ammunition is also sold to the fishing tackle manufacturers for use as lures and weights?
