

PEACE BRIDGE AT FALLS OF NIAGARA

Delegates Agree Memorial Should Take Form of Permanent Structure.

FREE COMMUNICATION

Sir Arthur Lawley's Sentiments Meet With Approval of All.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., May 19.—(Special.)—"In peace lies the secret of the future prosperity of these two great English-speaking nations. In commemoration of the past hundred years of peace we should erect here at Niagara Falls a bridge that would be free that will show that there are no obstacles in the way of friendly intercourse between the people of these two great nations," said Sir Arthur Lawley of the British Peace Centenary Commission at the civic breakfast tendered the peace delegates today.

"Such bridge," continued Sir Arthur, "would set a good example for other nations. I am hopeful of seeing England and the United States hand in hand; it would be in accord with the cause of humanity and peace. What we want is a monument that will last forever, one that will prove to the world that friendly relations do exist and will continue to exist forever. I believe that the construction of a bridge would be the most suitable way of commemorating the one hundredth anniversary of the signing of the treaty of Ghent."

United in Sentiment. Sir Arthur Lawley's remarks seemed to echo the sentiment of every one of the 150 men present. Without exception the other delegates were in accord with his views on the matter and there is no doubt that the men appointed by the two governments to arrange for the celebration of the hundredth anniversary of peace was enthusiastic over the proposition to have the bridge here.

Mr. Louis L. Seamen of the American committee, an extensive traveler and author, set forth the idea that England and the United States should establish a court of arbitration, with power behind it to back up its decisions.

"One hundred years of peace is not such a great achievement," he said; "the only way to obtain it is to establish a court of arbitration and abide by its decisions."

Kenard Thompson, consulting engineer, who drafted the plan of the proposed bridge, said that Niagara Falls would be the best place for the bridge and expressed the opinion that it will be located here.

Gutson Borglum, famous sculptor, has this to say: "Nature demands that the two shores be connected here, in a great permanent bridge. This matter is beyond us. We should be the ones to say where the bridge shall be; it is a problem for nature to solve. And when I look out upon the beautiful falls and its beautiful surroundings, there is no doubt in my mind that nature demands that the bridge be located here. Everybody concedes that this is the ideal site."

President Robin Boyle, Niagara Falls, Ont., board of trade; Industrial Agent E. T. Williams, Niagara Falls, N. Y.; Mayor C. C. Cole and several others spoke briefly.

After breakfast the visitors went to the power house of the Niagara Falls Power Co. and inspected the generating plant. The party also visited the Shredded Wheat Factory, in Buffalo avenue.

Farwell Luncheon. William Manley German, M.P., Welland, on behalf of Canada, bade the delegates farewell. George F. Nye, president of the board of trade, said good-bye to the American committee. Sir Arthur Lawley acknowledged the farewell addresses and extended the thanks of the visitors.

The international delegates left for Buffalo at 1:30 o'clock aboard the "Peace Special."

The site for the proposed peace bridge will be selected by a joint commission representing the United States and Canada. They will be appointed by each country.

NEW CATHOLIC HOME NEARS COMPLETION

Formal Opening of St. Philip's New Hostel Takes Place End of May.

TO RECEIVE NEWCOMER

Institution is For Benefit of Immigrants and Working Girls.

St. Philip Neri Hostel, a home for Catholic immigrants and other working girls, is about ready to open its doors to the class for whom it is intended. When The World called recently a staff of workers under the supervision of Miss Hoskin were making things ready for the formal opening, which will take place shortly.

The property, situated at 251 Sherbourne street, is most desirable as to location, being sufficiently central for convenience and at the same time retired enough to give it a quiet and homelike atmosphere. There will be accommodation for about thirty, and the whole interest in the home is to receive newcomers, there are arrangements for a certain number of permanent boarders.

The house, land and attachments were bought at a cost of \$20,000 by the Catholic Church Extension Society. New heating plumbing and wiring have been installed through and many down walls, placing cupboards and pantries have been made. Several of the city parishes have added their quota to the work of preparation. St. Basil's Ladies' Auxiliary have furnished the superintendent's room through; St. Anthony's did the same for one of the bedrooms; St. Helen's furnished the pillowcase and St. Peter's gave a kitchen shower.

Large Reception-Room. A large reception-room will be at the service of the girls and their friends. It will also be the nucleus of a club, the membership of which will not be confined to those in the house, but will be open to any not having homes, or who may care to come.

All the ladies now employed in the work of getting things in order are voluntary workers. Miss Hoskin, president of the Women's Auxiliary of Catholic Church Extension, is and will be general supervisor, and Miss Horigan, who will assume the office of resident superintendent, is also giving her service free.

WOOL KINGS IN DYNAMITE PLOT?

Serious Charge of Conspiracy to Discredit Labor Cause is Laid.

BOSTON, May 19.—(Can. Press).—The Commonwealth Attorney District Attorney Joseph C. Pallister today laid the foundation of its case against President Wm. M. Wood of the American Woolen Co. and Frederick Atteaux and Dennis J. Collins, who are charged with conspiracy to "plant" dynamite at Lawrence during the great textile strike of last year.

The international hearing directly on the alleged conspiracy was presented at the opening session of the trial, three witnesses testified to the finding of dynamite in the houses occupied by strikers.

The proceedings moved swiftly under the guidance of Judge John C. Crosby. The jury were selected in about an hour. The district attorney's address occupied less than half an hour and the testimony of five of the twenty-four witnesses for the state was heard before adjournment.

The district attorney said that the evidence would indicate that the three defendants conspired with John J. Brennan, an under-taker of Lawrence, and Ernest R. Pitman, a builder of Andover, to "plant" the dynamite for the purpose of prejudicing public opinion against the striking textile workers.

The trial will be continued tomorrow morning.
