

AMBITIOUS PLANS FOR BOARD OF TRADE

Extensive Program of Civic Improvements to Be Advocated During Season.

The Toronto Board of Trade is preparing for an active year in civic improvement and the general development of Ontario and Canada, and will in October resume the publication of the Board of Trade News, the official publication of the organization, which is not issued during the months of August and September. The members and officials of the organization are naturally proud of the things accomplished in the past, and point with pride to the creation of the harbor commission, the work on the new Welland canal, the agreement for a railroad viaduct on the water front and the initiation of the movement for good roads with an appropriation of \$160,000.

The scope of the future work of the board of trade may be understood from the appointment of special committees to draw attention to the subjects named, viz., harbor and Welland canal, railway and transportation, legislation and education, good roads, civic and social service, Ontario development, express rates and parcel mail, viaduct, publicity, federal square, foreign trade, membership and general committee of one hundred. The organization was incorporated in 1855 and now has a membership of 1,500.

GREEKS GUILTY OF ATROCITIES

Letters Which Fell Into Bulgarians' Hands Tell Dark Story.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Sept. 4.—(Can. Press).—In order to prove that Greek soldiers were responsible for a number of atrocities against the Bulgarians in the fighting last July between Bulgaria and her former allies, Greece, Serbia, and Montenegro, there has been made public in Sofia extracts from letters written by Greek soldiers and officers to friends at home. These letters were captured in a mail bag of the 19th regiment of the 7th Greek division by Bulgarian troops in the vicinity of Razlog. They have been given out by the Bulgarian telegraphic agency in pamphlet form. Each letter is printed in fac simile of the original Greek, followed by a translation in French, which gives the dates and the names signed to each communication.

The first letter in the pamphlet is dated July 11 and the last July 15. Extracts from some of these communications of Greek soldiers and officers follow:

Wholesale Massacres.
"We have burned all the villages belonging to the Bulgarians. We have massacred every member of the Bulgarian nation who has fallen into our hands. Out of 1,200 prisoners that we took at Nigrita only 41 remained in prison, and everywhere we went we have left no root of this race."

Another letter from a sergeant says: "We burned the two villages of Doulifi and Banitza, and put every Bulgarian to the bayonet or the flame. We executed only 12 of the women, children and old people, and churches. We did all this without pity and without grace."

A third letter, dated Nasto River, July 12, says: "Here at Vrondon I captured five Bulgarians and a girl from Serres. We shut them up in a cage with women, children and old people, and churches. We did all this without pity and without grace."

The letter is signed Sosa.

BIG CROP ASSURED IN SASKATCHEWAN

Two-Thirds Already Cut—Wheat is of Reasonably High Grade.

REGINA, Sask., Sept. 4.—(Can. Press).—The total grain crop of Saskatchewan is now practically assured promises to exceed that of 1912 by several million bushels, says Hon. W. E. McArthur, minister of agriculture.

The crop will be of an unusually high grade, and if frost keeps off for balance of the season Saskatchewan will have every reason to be well satisfied with the results of the year's operations. To reap a bountiful harvest in a season in the early months of which the outlook seemed far from promising, is exceptionally gratifying.

Two-thirds of the Saskatchewan crop is now cut, and it is all in first-class condition. The balance will be harvested as fast as binders can be made to work and this unit grain is in good condition. In many districts cutting operations have been completed and where the grain has been cut later in maturing from 40 to 50 per cent has been harvested.

HUMBER BOULEVARD PLANS APPROVED

City Legal Dept. and Surveyors Pass on Deeds and Plans of Home Smith's Gift.

Home Smith's draft deed of 110 acres in the Humber valley to the city was inspected by City Solicitor Johnston, Commissioner Chambers and the surveyors yesterday. The surveyors declared that the description of the property was according to agreement, and they approved it. This practically makes good the deal between Home Smith and the city, and the commencement of the work of boulevarding the Humber valley.

The city solicitor says that there is no legal obstacle to carrying out the agreement with Home Smith separate from effecting the annexation of the territory between the city and the Humber valley.

It is becoming generally accepted that the majority of the property owners in the territory proposed to be annexed are unlikely to petition, and that annexation may not be further considered for some time.

The board of control will now arrange a conference with the provincial government upon turning over to the city the three islands in the Humber River. These islands are to be utilized in the boulevarding plans.
