FIRE KILLS HORSES AND DISABLES MANY MEN

Broke Out in Hold of Steamship Anglo-Californian in Montreal Port.

MONTREAL, Aug. 24.—Twenty-three men were taken to hospitals and 14 horses were suffocated as a result of a fire in No. 1 hold in the bow of the steamship Anglo-Californian in port here early this afternoon. The men were overcome by smoke and none was seriously injured except Percy Williams, chief cook of the Anglo-Californian, who was kicked by one of the animals on the vessel. His skull and right arm were fractured, but it is thought he may recover. but it is thought he may recover. Amongst the men overcome by smoke at the fire, the majority of whom were Montreal firemen, were District Fire Chief Marin and Marine Superintendent W. J. McGiffin of the Allan Line. The fire, which is thought to have been caused accidentally by a smoker among a quantity of hay on board the ship, did not seem to do very much damage, beyond killing 14 of the 916 horses in the hold and temporarily disabling 23 men.

THREE MILLION GERMANS ARE KEPT ON FIRING LINE

Kaiser Apparently Unable to Supply Equipment for Great Strategic Value Attach-Larger Forces at Front-Loss for Year Estimated at Million and Half Men.

German statement from an authoritive "British source" on Germany's p strength in men and her losses was made public here today.
