"The real unity which the country wants is that steadfast unity of purpose to defeat our enemies and to save our country and I entirely deny that the fact of holding a divergent view disunion

"I have seen criticisms of myself and reasons for my resignation of a very petty and malicious character, a source of weakness at a time requiring the motives to a party and "I do not desire to deal with these

ridiculous assertions except to say now, in the presence of many of my late colleagues, that since I entered the cabinet I never heard a word of discussion or dispute on those party questions which divided us before the war. In every cabinet meeting I attended we all devoted our energies wholly and solely to the discussion of questions which arose with reference to the prosecution of the war.

No Personal Differences.
"I also desire to say that during the whole time I have been in the cabinet I never have had any personal difference either with the prime minister, whose unvarying courtesy I desire to acknowledge, or with any one of my late colleagues. May I also add that no one realizes more than I the great difficulties under which we labor owing to the fact that our policy and methods must at all times be adopted in concert and co-ordination with our various allies, and must also very frequently be framed with a view to consulting sentiments and feelings in those neutral countries with whom we remain on friendly terms? This often has been lost sight of by critics of our
