

ATIONALIZE TELEPHONES

Legislation Committee Passes Resolution-Oddfellows Ask Grant-Paving Companies' Petitions

orialized by the city to take over telephone business in the Dominon of Canada and operate the same, and also that the Ontario government be requested to urge this policy upon the Dominion government."

This was the resolution brought before the civic legislation and reception committee yesterday afternoon and unanimously adopted. Ald. Harrison, the mover, asserted that the city had lost nearly a quarter of a million dollars thru failing to come to terms with the Bell over giving an exclusive franchise, as there was lost annually \$10,000.

The city solicitor, who had been asked to report on what steps the Manitoba municipalities were taking to get telephone legislation, said that from information received from Winnipeg no legislation was proposed for the expropriation of the Bell Telephone Co., but that the government had intimated an intention of asking legislature for power to operate a telephone system. It had been pointed out that as the Bell operated under a Dominion charter, the company's operation could not be interfered with by the province. Mr. Chisholm stated that the attorney-general of Manitoba had promised to forward him a draft of the bill as soon as ready for submission to the Manitoba house.

Ald. Noble didn't carry out his promise to appear before the committee with a request that legislation be sought for power to issue \$50,000 debentures for a municipal consumptive sanitarium. Dr. E. J. Barrick, who was on hand, had it pointed out to him that the ratepayers vote on the setting aside of that sum had no force other than as a referendum, and that leave to issue debentures could not be applied for until the city council had so ruled. He was advised to go to the board of control.

Was Once Situated in Detroit River, But Time Has Obliterated Landmarks.

Detroit, Feb. 8.—Gercon H. cauthier of Windsor is on trial in Judge Mansel's court here for alleged illegal fishing in

American waters.
Gauthler is a fisherman on a large scale at Fighting Island, which is in Canadian waters, about eight miles below Detroit, and is anxious that the present case against him should go to the supreme court for final determination of the boundary line between the United States and Canada,

Judging by the expert testimony given by members of the United States Survey Corps, the boundary line is a hazy subject in official circles. The maps of the Treaty of Ghent, made in 1816, and ratified in 1820, have been put in evidence, but experts say that the old landmarks of that time are now lost or obliterated,
Frederick Leeseman, chief draughtsman in the United States engineer's office, and Edward Molitor, assistant engineer in the construction of maps of the lake survey, were both on the stand to-day to give expert testimony. Neither could positively state the location of the international boundary.
