LINEMAN ELECTROCUTED.

Telephone and Current Wires Crossed With Fatal Effect. St. Catharines, June 6.—(Special)—Louis Hyde, a lineman in the employ of the Bell Telephone Company, was electrocuted in the vicinity of Montebello Park this afternoon, and Fred Franklin, also a lineman, was severely shocked, and is now in the hospital.

Hyde, who lives in Trenton, was at work on the line. He had hold of a wire which crossed the Lincoln Electric Light Company's wire, and the insulation being slightly worn the current passed thru the telephone wire and into Hyde's body.

Franklin hurried to his assistance but as soon as he touched him both men were thrown to the ground. It was some time before the wire was cut. Hyde was a single man.

RUSS CABINET MUST GO DONNAI ROUTS MINISTERS

Refuses to Listen to Them—Some Fiery Talk of A Coming Conflict.

St. Petersburg, June 6.—The lower house of parliament and the government are rapidly coming to close quarters, and the conflict which became inevitable the moment the popular assembly presented its demands in the address to the throne cannot be much longer delayed. The excitement in the interior is increasing daily. Partial strikes have begun at Kiev, Odessa, Moscow and other cities, and the peasants in some provinces are no longer restrained and have commenced to seize the land of the proprietors.

The scene at yesterday's session, when the house refused to listen to the ministers and practically drove them from the rostrum, clearly presents the issue of the emperor's project, which he gave notice yesterday, to change the regulations of the house so as to eliminate all control of the ministers either in the drafting or introduction of bills, was introduced to-day.

M. Annin and Alladin, the peasant party leaders, used the occasion to make violent speeches, in which they argued that it was useless for parliament to proceed in the regular way. The government intended to rely on bullets and bayonets, and it was the duty of parliament to recognize a banner under which the people would fight when the inevitable collision comes.

M. Rodichev, C. Anisimov and S. Retanoff, Constitutional Democrats, appealed to the members of the house not to lose their heads, but to proceed calmly and systematically with the work of battering a breach in the wall. Their arguments carried the day, and by practically unanimous vote M. Vinnar's project was referred to a committee.

Too Dangerous. The debate on the agrarian question was then resumed. The ministerial benches were empty to-day.

A prominent leader of the Constitutional Democrats informed the correspondent of the members of his party were confident the government would not dare to resort to extreme measures, as they must know that the Russian constitution of parliament would set the country in flames.

AT ODESSA. Odessa, June 6.—The strikers at this port are assuming such a menacing attitude that the authorities are acutely apprehensive of a repetition of the riotous confagration of last June. The Russian shipping companies have announced their intention to import immediately 2000 seamen from the Baltic ports, the local firemen, who are on strike, threaten to retaliate by blowing up the steamers and burning the port.

Seventeen hundred infantry, with machine guns, are stationed at the harbor in readiness to quell any riotous outbreak. It is declared to be purely political, as the Black Sea.

MAKING PROGRESS.

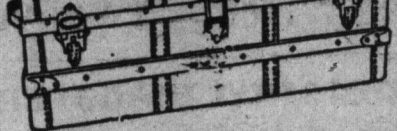

FOUR MEN IN DEEP WELL ARE SUFFOCATED BY GAS

Natural Gas Overcame Three and Fourth Going to Rescue Also Succumbed.

Winnipeg, June 6.—While working in the bottom of a deep well on a farm northeast of Battleford, three men were overcome by natural gas, and in an attempt to rescue them another man fell out of the bucket, and all four were dead when brought to the top.

The men were: C. Ralph, J. W. Robertson, G. Shoulas and J. McDonald. Considerable earth fell from the top of the well, but there is every indication that the men struck natural gas at the bottom of the well unexpectedly and were overcome before they could escape.

DIES IN THE FAR NORTH.

D. W. Davis, ex-M.P., Reported Dead at Dawson City.

A telegram was received last evening announcing the death at Dawson City of Donald Watson Davis, ex-M.P., ex-collector of customs at Dawson. Mr. Davis was a native of the State of Vermont and was 57 years of age. He served for a time in the 13th United States Infantry in the Western States as quartermaster-sergeant, and in 1870 settled at Macleod, N.W.T., as an Indian trader. He later became a general merchant and stock dealer. He was elected to parliament as a member of the Conservative party in 1877, 1882 and in 1896.
