VESSELS MUST GO SLOW.

Regulations have been adopted by the United States Government whereby vessels navigating the Soo River are limited to a speed not exceeding seven miles an hour. The object in making this regulation is to prevent the extensive wash on the banks which is the result of the big steamers going at full speed. The Bishop of London Made Archbishop of Canterbury.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Of the Right Hon. and Right Reva Frederick Temple, D.D.

London, Oct. 25 .- Right Hon. and Right Rev. Frederick Temple, D. D., Bishop of London, Provincial Dean of Canterbury, and Dean of the Chapel Royal, has been appointed Archbishop of Canterbury and Primate of all England, to succeed Right Hon. and Most Rev. Edward White Benson, who died suddenly at Hawarden. Oct. 11.

The new Archbishop of Canterbury s the son of an officer in the army. He was born Nov. 30, 1821, was educated at the Grammar school at Tiver ton, and, proceeding to Oxford, took enham, in 1848. This post he resigned in 1855, and, having held an inspector ship of schools during the interval, was appointed in 1858 headmaster of Rugby school. At the general election of 1868 Dr. Temple took an active part in support of Mr. Gladstone and the measure for the disestablishment of the Irish church, and the Premier nominated him to the Bishopric of Exeter an amountment which caused Exeter, an appointment which caused considerable commotion in clerical circles. Dr. Temple received episcopal consecration at Westminster Dec. 21, 1869. In January, 1885, Dr. Temple was appointed Bishop of London, and was succeeded at Exeter by Dr. Bick-
