

The Municipal Campaign Has Opened at Toronto Junction—Mayoralty Opponents are Clendennan and Armstrong.

Toronto Junction, Dec. 9.—(Special.)—The municipal campaign is now fairly well under way. There is going to be a straight fight between Dr. Clendennan and Reuben Armstrong for the Mayorship, and each candidate has his following for the Council in the respective wards of the town. The lines are distinctly drawn between what is now known as the Armstrong and Clendennan tickets. The Armstrong ticket is represented by Messrs. F. Goedke, R. Leachman, C. Wright, S. Ryding, J. R. Chisholm, J. Shultz, McLaughlin and James Bond, and the Clendennan ticket by Councilmen Gilbert, Powell, Linton, Laughton, Bill, Patterson, Torvell and Mr. Abernethy. The doctor has opened committee rooms in the Kilmara block, and to-morrow night a meeting will be held, at which candidates will be brought out to run with Councilors Bull and Patterson in Wards 1 and 2.

The Board of Works met to-night and received a typewritten offer from Mr. Chapman for a strip of land on the Lake Shore road for the use of the pumping station of the Toronto Junction waterworks. His offer is \$1500, the town to remit payment of the balance of costs to the waterworks in the litigation between the parties in the suits of Chapman v. Toronto Junction and the Attorney-General v. Chapman. The board decided to offer \$200, but will not consent to pay the costs, which amount to about \$200.

Judge Morgan has not yet received the petition requesting the removal of the 8th Division Court from West to Toronto Junction, but he knows it is coming, and has expressed himself unfavorably towards it.

The next of a series of parlor concerts in aid of the church debt of St. Martin's Church will be held at the residence of Mr. Mackay, 122 Franklin-st., to-morrow night.

Because a light has not been placed on Victoria-street according to resolution passed at the last meeting of Council, Mr. Brown has addressed an open letter to the Mayor, in which he charges the inaction as "a glaring outrage of city law."

North Toronto. The brackets for the electric wires on the Metropolitan extension line were being put up yesterday. President Warren is to come on the matter yesterday, mid: "We hope to have the cars running by the 15th inst. Another generator in the present power-house and a feed wire will be tried at first, and from the result of the trial the engineers will be able to decide where the second power house is to be erected." Asked if the company were going to introduce double-deck cars, he answered, "Mr. Warren said that the new belt line cars would be taken as the model."

A pretty little wedding was solemnized yesterday by Rev. Mr. Powell of St. Clement's Church, Belltown, between Mr. Gaston of Belltown-avenue and Mr. R. W. Wiltcher of Mimico.

North Toronto will provide two candidates for the County Council—Mayor Fisher and Barrister E. J. Connel.

It is said that Mr. George Lawson, formerly first deputy mayor, is to be elected to the Mayorship of the town.


