Notice to Toronto Railway Co. to
Remove Woodbine Avenue Tracks
Expires To-Morrow.

SOME TROUBLE IS CONTEMPLATED.

Storm Paralyzes Suburban Street
Car Service—Reception to a
Strathcona at Junction.

Toronto Junction, March 13.—Pte. H. B. Scott of Strathcona, Ont., supplied his friends and relatives by turning up today. It had been reported that he would go to the point of embarkment, but this appears to have been a mistake. Trooper Scott was born at Langton Mills, and will stay around the junction and at Langton for a month before going west. The committee appointed by the Town Council to arrange a reception met this evening, and decided upon holding the public demonstration in the hall on Saturday evening. Besides the medal which he wears on his breast, and which was given him by King Edward VII., which was given him in honor of his service in the Boer War, he will wear a gold watch and an illuminated address. Mayor Armstrong will give the chair; speeches will be given by Capt. Ross, A. Campbell, W. S. John and others, and a program of patriotic songs and recitations will be furnished by local talent. Every effort will be put forth to make the reception a happy one.
