

Stratton went fo Johannesburg eight years ago. He was among the several thousand men taken to Pretoria by Cronje upon their refusal to fight for the Boers, and was confined there until released by Roberts several months later. Stratton says he does not want the 160 acres of land granted by the government for his services in the army, and will give it to any deserving widow of a British sat-dier.




