

COUNCIL WILL CONSIDER IT

Metropolitan Agreement Passed Upon By the Board of Control and the Company.

SCHOOL BOARD IS OBSTINATE

Neglect to Send Detailed Statement of Urgent Needs—The Day at the City Hall.

The proposed agreement between the city and the Metropolitan Railway Company in regard to the entrance of the company's cars in the city was passed by the Board of Control and the company yesterday afternoon, and will go to the Council on Monday night.

Mr. Warren and Mr. Moyes were again in attendance upon the board. In regard to the clause relating to mileage, the Mayor said that would pay the cost of the track allowance pavement. Mr. Warren said the company could not go any further than \$200,000 for cars come into the city the Toronto Railway Company's every cent," he said.

The Mayor remarked that he didn't think it was any use discussing the relations of the Metropolitan and Toronto Railway Companies as separate concerns. "We know very well certain facts and must look them in the face," said His Worship, to which Mr. Warren replied that he was present to look after the interests of his own company and no other, and that he had not made money out of the road. It was agreed that the mileage to be paid to the city be placed at \$200,000.

Crossing at Yonge-street. The board's recommendation that the city should in procuring an order from the Railway Commission for a level crossing on Yonge-street at the present southern terminus of the Metropolitan was changed. The clause read: "On or near Yonge-street, a crossing of the Metropolitan will be established, the words 'or near' were objected to by Mr. Warren, and were struck out. The President Macdonald of the Toronto Railway Company was again absent, and when Aid. Sheppard asked Mr. Warren if he had not made money out of the road, the reply was: "Well, they have not been here to object."

Second Board is Obsolete. The resolutions of the Public School Board, asking for \$200,000 for expenses at the end of the year and asking for \$200,000 to be raised by debentures for completion of Bathurst-street school, and also asking for \$50,000 for teachers' salaries, were read. The first matter was taken up, and Aid. Lamb remarked that the resolution was not what the Board of Control had asked for, and which the department of the School Board had on Wednesday last agreed to supply. "We had a strong desire to assist them in case of urgency, and we asked them for particulars. This they have entirely ignored and have simply sent on a formal resolution prepared by their solicitor. They are simply determined to go to the full letter of the law, and I think it is a great pity they have assumed their present attitude," said Aid. Lamb regretfully.

time His Worship expressed the hope that the School Board would supply what they have obviously omitted, viz. the particulars of the \$200,000 they ask to be presented to the Council on Monday night. He had thought the Council would grant the money until these particulars were forthcoming.

In regard to the \$200,000 bylaw for Bathurst-street school, Mr. Caswell reported that it had been legally passed by the Council if worded to show the manner in which the expenditure of the money had become necessary.

The communication regarding salaries was sent on to the Council.

Cattle Market Addition. Aid. Hubbard wanted to know how the city would put the \$22,500 voted for the enlargement of the Cattle Market. He said the Board of Control had not in next year's estimates, and the Mayor remarked that it was too late this year to make a change, but it was more use to the city than it was to anyone else.

According to the finding of Aid. Lamb, the receipts and expenditures of the Cattle Market only about balanced each other annually, but Aid. Sheppard said that the Cattle Market had been built by its own rental receipts, and the city was an additional \$100,000 in cash on hand. Aid. Lamb said that the market could not be sold for that figure, but Aid. Sheppard said it was nevertheless worth that amount to the city. He did not think the City Hall could be sold for that price, but it was more use to the city than it was to anyone else.

Cattle Market Figures. In criticising Aid. Lamb's figures, Aid. Sheppard pointed out that the profits of the Cattle Market for the past six years were: 1896, receipts \$24,000, expenses \$19,150; 1897, receipts \$23,887, expenses \$21,852; 1898, receipts \$23,372, expenses \$18,891; 1899, receipts \$23,084, expenses \$19,240; 1900, receipts \$24,174, expenses \$19,640; 1901, receipts \$30,000, expenses \$17,500. The board decided to postpone the purchase of the \$22,500 lot of land until next year.

Extra \$12,500 Voted. The request of the City Commissioner for \$12,500 more, making almost \$20,000, required over the appropriations came along and was granted. Aid. Sheppard said it was the same old story of spending money without regard to the estimates. Aid. Lamb admitted that, but moved that the additional money be voted. The commissioner submitted about 200 accounts for...

Will Repeal the Tax. The Controllers were requested by Messrs. Elias Rogers and John Harvey to repeal the tax on the property of the Y. V. C. Guild, McGill-street. The assessment was made because the hall was being rented for religious purposes. The request of the deputation was granted.

C. R. Mabee's proposition to place waste paper boxes on the streets and give the city half the profits from advertising was referred to the Engineer. Aid. Sheppard thought the city might utilize the work on its own account if necessary.

The City Relief Officer has received from the Canadian Rubber Company a case of rubber to be used as Christmas presents for Toronto's deserving poor.

The Street Railway Company has promised the City Engineer that a better street car service will be given on the Bell Line, and that the company will improve the service on various routes to meet the requirements of the rush of Christmas shoppers.
