To-day's bloodshed at Warsaw, however, is likely to very seriously affect the situation there and may cause a general strike. The temper of the people is at white heat, and there is much apprehension regarding the possible events of May 5, the 114th anniversary of the proclamation of the Polish constitution, on which disturbances and demonstrations always occur.

All the ground that has been gained since the disturbances of last January has been lost.
