WATER AS AN AIR PURIFIER.
The air of a room may be purified in two hours by sitting inside of it a wide-mouthed pitcher filled with pure cold water. In three hours at most it will have absorbed all the respirable gases in the room, leaving the air purer by that much, but the water will be too filthy to use, if one be clean and could see what it has taken in. It is estimated that a common pitcher of cold water will absorb in six hours one quart of carbonic acid and several pints of ammonia from the air. For the purpose of purifying the air the water is all right, but don't use it to wash in or to drink. For those purposes use fresh water, just drawn, or from vessels that are always covered either by metal or china, or by several folds of clean, like a clean towel. Care in the use of drinking water would avert

CAMERON'S

(London Presbytery.)

Rev. Mr. Miller, of Moss, Accepts a Call to Ashfield.

Says the Moss Manse Was Unhealthy—Schemes of the Church to be Brought Before All Congregations.

The Presbytery of London met in Knox Church, St. Thomas, on Tuesday, Nov. 10, at 11 a.m., Rev. M. P. Talling, of St. James' Church, London, presiding.

Communications were read from the congregations of Alisa Craig and Carling, and these were referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. Currie, Johnston, Stuart and Henderson, to report at the afternoon session.

A call was presented to Mr. Miller, Moss, from the congregation of Lingwick, and was supported by Mr. Dewar, of Alisa Craig.

A call was also presented to the same gentleman from the congregation of Ashfield, and was supported by Rev. Mr. Murray, of Kincardine, and Mr. Hugh Chambers, Messrs. Munro, McVicar and Campbell were heard from Moss, in opposition to the call made, and reasons against Mr. Miller's translation were read.

The court adjourned till 1:30 p.m. A circular re Sabbath schools was read from the assembly's convener, and on motion was received.

A circular from the foreign mission secretary was also read, and Mr. R. Johnston was heard in support of the matter presented. It was decided that a committee be appointed to bring the schemes of the church before all the congregations in the Presbytery if possible within the next year.

The call from Lingwick and also from Ashfield having been put in the hands of Mr. Miller, of Moss, he declared his intention of accepting the call from Ashfield, his reason for leaving Moss being that the manse was unhealthy. It was moved by Mr. Kelso that the translation be granted, that sympathy be expressed for the congregation of Moss, and that the pulpits be declared vacant on the last Sabbath of November. Mr. Miller was instructed to hold himself at the disposal of the Maitland Presbytery. Carried.

Mr. Ross was appointed to preach the pulpit vacant, and to act as interim moderator.

Messrs. Henderson and Ross were appointed a committee to prepare a minute expressive of the Presbytery's appreciation of Mr. Miller's services and regret at his departure.

Messrs. Currie, Ross, Henderson and Dewar were appointed to prepare for a series of meetings at which the
