## On the Stage.

Realistic Horse Race Ends in Death.

Jockey Badly Smashed and Supra-

Hurt.

Horse Jumped Through a Window—Cut His Throat and Had to be Killed.

New York, Dec. 31.—An exciting event occurred upon the stage of the Harlem Opera House during the "real Derby scene" in the "Sporting Duchess."

A number of horses ridden by jockeys dash twice across the stage, beginning and finishing a race. One of them was the old steppesman Gilmore, ridden by Walter Whyburn, formerly a Guttenberg jockey. On the first entrance Gilmore was leading when a dangle rope struck his head. Startled by the blow, Gilmore reared wildly forward, almost throwing Whyburn out of the saddle. The jockey quickly pulled in the loose lines, but the horse caught the bit between its teeth and plunged towards the door. Henry Stichman, the electrician of the theater, saw the jockey's danger, jumped in front of the horse, waving his hands. The animal knocked him down, Harry Thompson and Dennis Nicholas, "supers," were tossed about the scenery, and were painfully bruised about the head and body. Electrician Stichman was cut about the arms and legs.

Whyburn realized the danger, and after vainly trying to stop the runaway, attempted to dismount, when the horse dashed through the west door of the alleyway. The jockey's head struck against the brick arch over the door, and he was thrown heavily to the floor of the stage, sustaining contusions of the scalp and face.

Gilmore dashed across the alleyway and plunged into an office window back of the postoffice station. There was a heavy grating in the window, through which the horse, going at full speed, struck its head, breaking a large pane of glass inside, and severing an artery. Its foot got tangled in step-ladders, fracturing one of its legs. A veterinary was called and ordered the animal shot.

FIFTEEN DROWNED!

Loss of the French Steamer Deux Freres.

Calais, Dec. 31.—The French steamer Deux Freres, from Fecamp for this port, has been foundered. Fifteen of the crew were drowned.

SENT SAILING.

Abdul Hamid's New Way to Pay Cid.

Constantinople, Dec. 31.—Seventeen hundred disbanded Turkish marines made a hostile demonstration at the arsenal on Tuesday, demanding their arrears of pay. They received a portion of the money due them and were then separated into small bodies and sent to different parts of Anatolia.
