#### WON MILLIONS

And Now the Second-Hand Dealer May Roll in Wealth.

Victoria, B. C., June 2.-By the allowance of the appeal in the case of Hobbs vs. the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway Company, by the supreme court of Canada, E. V. Hobbs, a second-hand dealer of Douglas street, this city, becomes a millionaire. Several years ago Hobbs bought 160 acres of land in the Esquimalt and Nanalmo grant. When the deed was completed the company included reservation of all coal and other minerals. Hobbs re-fused to accept this, and also refused the return of his purchase money, suing for specific performance of con-tract. The highest tribunal of Canada has now affirmed Hobbs' right to the vast coal deposits that are being worked beneath his property.

Mayor Teetzel stated that the employers of Hamilton have been importing aliens to take the place of the strikers. Sir Wilfrid in his answer stated that the high commission had consented to a suspension of the alien laws of the two countries pending a settlement of the various questions before it. Could A in case of the death of B remove the house, under an agreement with B to that effect, or could the heirs force A to remove it before the term would be up. Ans.—Upon the facts stated, A could not remove the house after the death of B, and the heirs could not force him to remove it before her death. They should be parties to the agreement if A is to have any right to remove the building after the death of B.

KOMOKA-A owns a farm; B has a lot backing into it; C owns lots on the other side of the road fronting it. Some of A's land is springy, in which starts a running stream, which flows past B's on the side and then across the road through C's to the river. C has put in 5-inch tile, which take all water ordinarily, but in time of freshets, when it sometimes overflows a small corner of B's. Can B make C take out the tile, and make an open ditch? Measure Introduced by Hon. David Mills

Mode of Investment Specified -No Loan Company to Invest in Stock of Another Loan Company.

Ottawa, June 2.—In the Dominion Senate on Wednesday, Hon. David Mills introduced a bill respecting loan companies. This bill, he explained, was much the same as the one introduced last session, and gives the governor in council power to incorporate loan companies by letters patent on the application of five persons. The bill provides that there must be a provisional board of directors, three of whom must be mentioned. It pro-vides that a company may be formed by the amalgamation of one or more companies in existence, and in all cases where sufficient capital has been subscribed the company shall organize and elect or appoint a permanent board of directors. It specifies the mode in which loan companies may invest, giv-ing them great latitude, but providing that no one loan company shall invest in stock of another loan company. It provides that loan companies may issue preference stock, but if so the stock must be charged as debentures; and contains provisions for the amaigamation of two or more loan companies established under the act, and for an increase or decrease of the capital of the companies. There had, he said, some improvements suggested since last session in the bill, and the provincial authorities had objected that their rights might be interfered with by the legislation. He had altered the bill in this connection. It was a proper thing to incorporate loan companies, as they were allied to the banks on the one hand, and to trade and commerce on the other. If the bill be-came law, he thought it would lessen the necessity for application for individual acts of incorporation. Sir Mackenzie Bowell asked if the

proposed bill would affect companies now in existence, or only those to be incorporated.

Hon. David Mills said the bill would affect companies incorporated under it, and those already in existence which chose to come under its operation. Sir Mackenzie Bowell pointed out that several loan companies took deposits. How would that be affected by this act? Would the claims of depositors take preference?

Hon. David Mills said that the bill

did not interfere with that. Sir Mackenzie Bowell judged from what the minister had said that it was provided in the bill for the amalgamation of several companies without their coming to parliament. This, he believed, was a power claimed by the provinces. No doubt the government had considered the matter well.

GAVE \$10,000,000 TO A UNIVERSITY. San Francisco, June 1 .- Mrs. Stanford, widow of the senator who built and endowed the university bearing his name, has just deeded the bulk of her stocks and real estate, valued at \$10,-000,000, to the university.

SHOT BY HER HUSBAND. Keene, N. H., June 1.-Mrs. Louis Castor, a French-Canadian, was shot and killed yesterday forenoon at the residence of Mrs. William Van Ness. The police are searching the woods in the vicinity of the murder for Mrs. Castor's husband, who is charged with committing the deed.
