> Extraordinary Doings in Dominion Penitentiary. Wholesale Stealings by Officers and Manipulating of Tenders for

Partisan Friends. Many Thousands of Dollars Stolen or Wasted Under the Late Government.

Ottawa, Jan. 27.-The report of the commissioners appointed to investigate her either personally or by photograph. the affairs of the St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary, under the late government of the Dominion, is in the hands of the minister of justice. Its summarized contents are of a highly sensational character. It is a story of malfeasance in office, theft, waste of public money and misappropriation of public property. The public works storekeeper's account shows a shortage of \$30,000. The guards and convicts practiced petty thieving constantly. Guards employed convicts to steal supplies from the stores. The stores were first filled with goods not required, but purchased from political friends of the party then in power at exorbitant prices, and afterwards stolen. Some guaris sold delicacies to the convicts. Grocers called on some of the convicts and took their orders for what they wanted. Warden Ouimet did not restrain these irregularities. Important papers and records were deliberately destroyed. The parties chosen to furnish good and supplies were picked out, irrespective of tenders, and in most cases were the highest tenderers. Tendelivered. The commissioners describe this as heartless to a degree of brutalney in them in many instances. Some ened them and found endearing letters

with money in them, sent to ease the hardship of prison life endured by their The lowest bid was 100.30. loved ones. Many of these letters contained prayers and sacred embiems and exhortation to earn remission time by good conduct and come out to live an honest life. These letters were never delivered. The present Mr. Justice Burbidge, then deputy minister of justice, went at night to the penitentiary with Warden Laviolette's report on the revolt of 1886, and demanded that he should alter it. He refused, because he said it contained the truth about the institution, and he was a dying man and would not tell anything but the truth to the minister at Ottawa, John Thompson. Mr. Barbidge left the report there, and it was found by the commissioners that the stamp of the department on it had been suppressed. Exorbitant prices were paid for supplies. For instance,
