Answer—Yes, unless his father became a naturalized citizen of the United States, which would make the son a citizen of the United States also. If his father was not naturalized in the United States, then he is still British (Irish), and the son is also British.

Question—Would a Canadian who has taken out his first papers in the United States, and who registered on June 5, and is now awaiting his call from the United States authorities, be required to ask for an exemption if living in Canada at present?

SUBSCRIBER.

Answer—The question is one over which legal opinion is liable to differ, owing to the fact that it is not clear as to just what is meant by 'first papers.'

If he took an oath at the time his first papers were issued renouncing allegiance to the British crown, then he is no longer a British subject, and would not be subject to the call here.

If, on the other hand, he has not done anything which would cause him to cease to be a British subject in taking out his first papers, the mere fact that he registered there would not affect.
