

Beck is Displeased at Idea of Federal Government's Plan

Eager to Meet Demands.

Proposal To Give the Railway Board Additional Power Condemned by London M. P. P.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, May 9 .- "It is another intance of the Federal Government in erfering with provincial and municipal rights," said Sir Adam Beck, when asked his opinion on the action of the railway committee of the Federal House, which proposes to give the rail way board power to override agreements regarding rates existing between nunicipalities and railway companies holding dominion charters. "This will cullify all agreements as to rates existng between municipalities and such companies as the Burlington radial What right has the Dominion Government to interfere in this matter? It is another example of what they are doing continually. What concern of the people of Canada as a whole is an agreement between a railway and a municipality regarding rates. With the sanction of the railway board they can now raise the rates as high as they like. It is unjustifiable."
