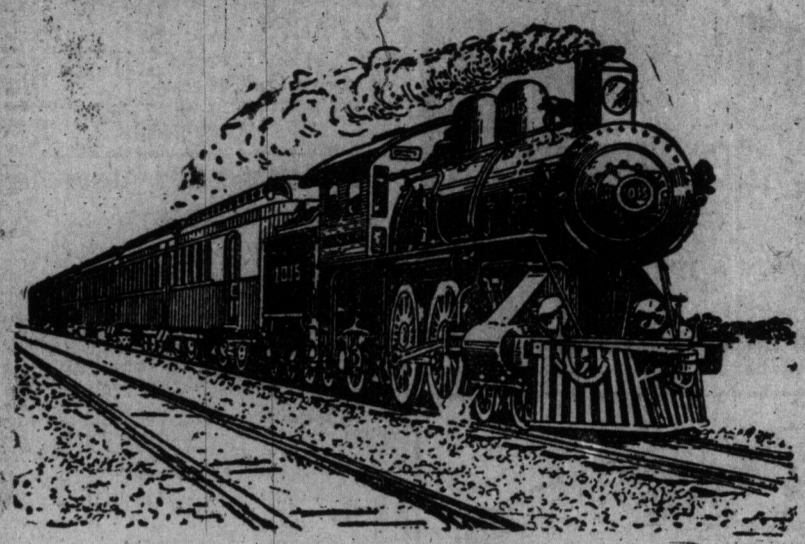

GIRL IS ACCUSED

Jacob Hopkins awoke, and according to his own statement, "went to the bedroom window to see what the weather was like, as I saw that The Toronto World forecast showed rain. On looking out he was horrified to find the whole farm buildings ablaze. Hastily donning some clothing he rushed out to find that the fire had gained such headway as to dispel all hope of saving the live stock and farm produce that were in the buildings. The fire included 13 head of cattle, 3 horses, 2 pigs and 65 hens, besides 200 bushels of turnips, 200 bushels of oats, 100 bushels of barley, 75 bushels of wheat, 10 tons of hay and many valuable farm implements. The buildings destroyed were: A frame barn, 30 ft. x 52 ft.; cow stable, 28 ft. x 24 ft.; log barn, 40 ft. x 28 ft. and an adjoining hen-house and pigery. The loss on live stock and produce is estimated at \$1500. The entire loss, including buildings, \$3000. The total insurance is \$350.

Tracing the Culprit.
Six or seven young men who reside around the neighborhood hastened over to the scene of the conflagration and discovered footprints in the snow, leading up to within a few feet of the buildings. They commenced a trail of the footprints and Norman Kay, one of their number, stated to-day over oath that they followed the impressions in the snow right to the gate of the Allen home, near Brown Hill, a distance of five miles across the fields. These footprints constituted the main part of the incriminating evidence and the crown's purpose was to prove that they were those of Mabel Allen. The impressions of the rubbers were in the soft snow, and the witnesses stated that there were particular markings, that the prints were about 1-1/2 inches long by actual measurement and that they were evidently those of a young woman. Mr. Fitch, on the other hand, stated that the girl's rubbers measure ten inches and that the impressions noticed around and in front of the house might have been caused by some person who was used to walking on the snow. The girl positively denied being out of her own house during the night of the tragedy, and in this she was substantiated by the members of her family. She left the Hopkins home in August of last year.

The town hall was crowded and the greatest interest taken in the case by the townspeople, who regard the occurrence as one that will live in the records of Mount Albert for many a day. 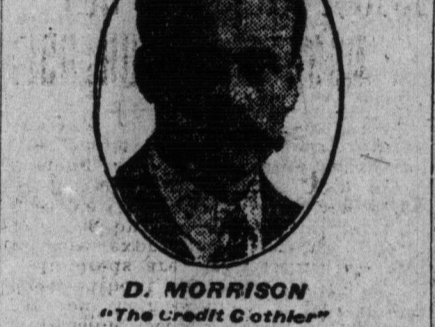
"York County" brought responses from Reeve W. H. Fuglesy, County Clerk John H. Ramsden, J. M. Anderson and George T. Henry.

LIGHTHOUSE A PRISON FOR MAN AND CORPSE

For Seven Days Assistant is Storm-bound, Then Stumbles Over Ice to Mainland.
CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 21.—Fleeing in terror over long stretches of treacherous ice from the Toledo harbor lighthouse, where for seven days he had been imprisoned, with the dead body of Capt. Delos Hayden, Joe Berner reached the city yesterday afternoon.

He brought the news of the death of friends and relatives, telling of the nerve-racking vigil beside the dying man in the lonely lighthouse, and, as still more terrifying experience while watching over the dead body, waiting for a turn in the weather which would permit his escape.

Hayden was conscious to the last and left a message for each of his relatives and friends. He died in his faithful companion's arms. Berner placed the body in one of the lower rooms of the lighthouse and began his wait for an opportunity to reach shore.

Around the lighthouse the ice was firm under the snow, and when Berner started out at 1 o'clock Wednesday afternoon he had strong hopes of reaching the shore in safety. Yet the trial was extremely perilous. He was not even equipped with a pike pole with which to sound the ice, and he fell many times into alcohols. He also found much open water and frequently by the merest chance escaped death.

Berner cannot explain how he happened to reach Cedar Point yesterday. He had no idea as to the direction in which he was walking, and he had been walking for some time west of the course he happened to take he would have missed land altogether. It took him three hours to reach Cedar Point and then proceeded to the city.

A relief expedition of five men started for the Toledo harbor light to-day to bring the body of Capt. Delos Hayden to Toledo, where an invalid widow awaits it. They will make the journey with a 16-foot boat on runners.
