Builders' Laborers Hopeful of Victory by Week's End.


Since many employers are signing the agreement without any hesitation there is every indication that the builders' laborers' strike will be concluded by the end of the week The men have only been on strike one day and already the wage committee reports 62 employers as having signed. The fact also that of the 1200 laborers only 200 signed the strike sheet yesteris evidence that many bosses besides those who have yet been heard from have intimated a willingness to pay the increased wages. "The men could not have called a

strike at a more opportune time." said bricklayers, foreman on one of construction work in the city. "The supply of brick is just arriving from the kilns for many of the buildings, and for those who are tied up by contracts it is a serious matter.

The hoisting engineers did not decide last night to go out on a sympathetic strike, but it was left with the members individually to refuse to work on a mater of principle, should labor be employed where they worked.

The lathers went on strike yesterday and altho a number of their bosses have intimated a willingness to pay the increase from \$3.10 to \$3.50 per day. the union have decided that none of men will return to work until a ajority of the bosses have signed.

Milk from cows which have inflam-mation of the udder should never be used for human consumption. The streptococcus which causes the inflammation, is easily carried in the milk, and in the case of children especially, will bring about inflammation of the intestine.


