Needs Readjusting.

*7.—The need of seeking for new sources of natural gas at greater depth is apparent; this not only brings greatly increased costs, but also multiplies the risks, and the production end of the natural gas business is a miner's risk not lightly undertaken.

8.—The commercial end of the enterprise is hedsed in with contractual obligations assumed when the fields were young and the wells flush, and the whole situation under prevailing conditions holds out no promise of improvement.

This year about \$13,500,000 are being spent by the province for roads.
