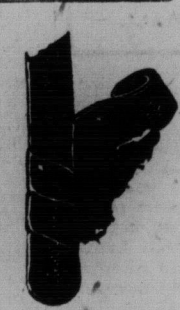

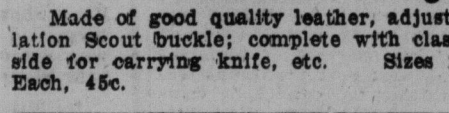

KEEPING NOSKE OUT OF REICHSTAG

Former German Minister of Defence Jettisoned by Majority Socialists.

Berlin, June 20.—Gustav Noske, formerly German minister of defence, who was a powerful factor in putting down the Kapp revolution, has been jettisoned by the Majority Socialists.

Yielding to the pronounced opposition of the party's left wing, its governing body, which Philipp Scheidemann now dominates, decided to keep Noske out of the Reichstag.

Noske is shortly to publish his revolutionary reminiscences under the title "From Kiel to Kapp." In the early days of November, 1918, Prince Max's government hurriedly despatched Noske to Kiel for the purpose of checking the naval insurrection.

Great Phosphate Deposits Are Discovered in Morocco

Paris, July 5.—Discovery of large deposits of phosphate in the Moroccan hinterland may soon make France the great phosphate-producing country of the world.

The Moroccan deposits are reported by Prof. Louis Gentil of the Sorbonne as being almost inexhaustible. One hundred miles inland from Casablanca there is a mountain plateau, 40 miles long and 25 miles wide, which is a veritable storehouse of phosphate.

DOMINION TRANSPORT WORKERS Standing Pat in Montreal

Montreal, July 5.—Both sides in the strike of the 200 employees of the Dominion Transport Company were standing pat tonight, the men holding out for their demands and the company taking the ground that such demands, meaning an addition of \$28,000 annually to the pay roll, were impossible unless the railway commission authorized an increase in carriage rates.

Montreal Master Plumbers Refuse Union Men's Demands

Montreal, July 5.—A unanimous decision not to accede to the demands of the plumbers affiliated with the international organization was reached today at a meeting of the Master Plumbers' Association of Montreal. The men are asking for a 44-hour week, a rate of \$1.00 per hour with \$2.00 per hour for all hours worked in excess of an eight-hour day.

FIRST CONFLICT OVER COMPENSATION

Local Government in Ireland in Direct Hostility to Central Government.

Dublin, July 5.—The net result of the recent county council elections is that now both in the cities and in the counties in 28 out of the 32 counties the local government is in direct hostility to the central government.

The first conflict between them will arise out of the question of paying compensation for outrage. Every day the judges are awarding to the relatives of murdered policemen, to injured policemen, and to the owners of burned police premises, large sums as compensation chargeable on the local rates. The total already runs up close to £750,000.

The local authorities have refused to collect taxes for these payments. In the case of some of them, the government can secure money by deducting from the sums payable to the local authorities by the imperial exchequer in relief of local taxes.

In the majority of cases, the parties awarded compensation have only acquiesced in giving the local authorities a right to sue the local authorities in the courts for the money. It is believed that even after judgment is given, the local authorities will refuse to pay. Many of them have passed resolutions saying they will recognize no authority save that of their own.

The government has decided to introduce a bill in parliament to enforce payment of this compensation money.

Weibull. A wheel is being held without bail on charges of driving a car while in an intoxicated condition and with criminal negligence.
