Of the 1,674 in-door patients treated to a termination there died 113 or 6.75 per centum. If 30 deaths which occurred within three days after admission be deducted, the mortality is reduced to 5.05 per centum, about one per cent. below that of last year. The average daily number of patients in the wards throughout the year was 130. The average number of days of each patient in Hospital was 26.14 days.

In the out-door departments of the Hospital there were fifteen thousand four hundred and thirty-one (15,431) consultations with patients, a reduction of seven hundred and ninety-two (792) below the number of last year. Of these consultations four thousand six hundred and forty (4,640) were given in the "Out-door Eye and Ear department" and ten thousand seven hundred and ninety one (10,791) in the "General Out-door department."
