COUNTRY MARKET

Lamb and vegetables are arriving in larger quantities at the country market, where, judging from present indications, there will be goodly store with a large variety for Sunday buyers to select from.
Mutton, however, is reported scarce. Retail figures, which vary somewhat from those of last week, range as follows: Lamb from \$1.00 to \$2.00. Beef ranges from 3 to 20c per lb.; veal, 10 to 16c; pork, 12 to 16c; mutton, 12 to 20c; fowls, \$1.15 to \$1.50 per pair; turkeys 20 to 22c per lb.; ox tails, 8c; sausage, 15c per lb.; sweetbreads, 20c per pair; potatoes, 20c per peck; carrots, 20c; onions, 50c per peck or 5c per lb.; radishes, 5c per bunch; cucumbers 10c; tomatoes, 15 to 20c per lb.; lettuce, 5c per head; native celery, 10c per head; native spinach, 40c per peck; creamery butter, 30c per lb.; dairy rolls, 28 to 30c; tub butter, 28 to 30c; Henery eggs, 22c. per dozen, and cased eggs, 18c; Maple sugar from 16 to 20c per lb.; cauliflower bring 15 to 20c per head and rhubarb, 4c; asparagus, 25c per bunch; sweet potatoes, 6c per lb.

A FINE NEW HOME FOR SOUTH END SOCIETY

St. John The Baptist Society to A Have Commodious Club house on St. James Street-- Will be Gotten Under Way at Once.

St. John The Baptist Society has taken the initial step towards the erection of a fine new hall, by the purchase of a piece of land situated on St. James street, between Charlotte and Germain. The site, which was the property of the Bartholomew Gunter estate was taken over by day, the deal having been put through by James H. Doody.

The society's new home which will be a commodious structure designed and equipped along strictly modern lines will rank among the finest of its kind in the city. The formation of the land is such that but little excavating will be necessary there is a considerable cavity.
The intention is to devote the lower portion of the building to the society's apartments, which will consist of meeting room, bowling alley, billiard room, etc., while above these will be situated the auditorium, which will be equipped for concerts and various kinds of entertainments.
