In the words of Victor Hugo, whom nobody will accuse of being much in sympathy with religious thought or movement, "Give the workingman who suffers-to whom this world is hard—the notion of a better world prepared for him, and he will be quiet and patient. Patience springs from hope, therefore spread the Gospel in villages. Put a Bible in every house and every brook and every field will show the moral result."
