BRITAIN BUILDS DIRIGIBLES FOR TEST FLIGHTS

English Representative to Visit Various Dominions TO SELECT SITES

Overseas Premiers Have Promised Co-operation for Organization Work

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The framework of a huge world airway organization should be in existence within the next two or three years, ready for the experimental flights of the two great dirigibles now being built in England.

The Australian, Canadian and South African governments are considering the establishment of air bases in their respective countries, Premiers Bruce, Mackenzie King and Hertzog having promised full co-operation with the British air board in development of an Empire airship service.


Four Children Burned While Mother Absent
