LARGE BLOCKS BRAZILIAN AND SMELTERS SOLD

Lake of the Woods, up Eight Points, Is Strong Spot on Board

BULLS RESUME WALL ST. DEMONSTRATIONS

General Motors Feature, Gaining 3 to New High Record

MONTREAL, July 28.—Trading was brisk during the first half hour on the local stock exchange this morning, and prices showed a general disposition to move upward. Brazilian and Smelters were the most active issues, over a thousand shares of each of these stocks being traded today in response to reports of a change in the Brazilian market. Brazilian moved up 10 1/2, up three-quarters, and in subsequent trading touched 12 1/2. Smelters opened unchanged at 12 1/2, later moving forward to 22 1/2, for a gain of five-eighths point. Abitibi was in good demand at 75. Other features included Spanish River, off a half at 90. Price Bros. Ltd., unchanged at 100. Winnipeg Rails up a half at 90 1/2, and Steel up a half at 104 1/2. Lake of the Woods, being up eight points on a board lot transaction at 148.

NEW YORK, July 28.—Bullish demonstrations were continued with increased vigor at the opening of the stock market today in response to reports of heavy mid-summer business and expanding earnings. General Motors again was the feature of the initial dealings, mounting three points to a new high record around 182, while numerous gains of one to four points included United States Steel, East Iron Pipe, Loew's Wiles and Conglomerate.

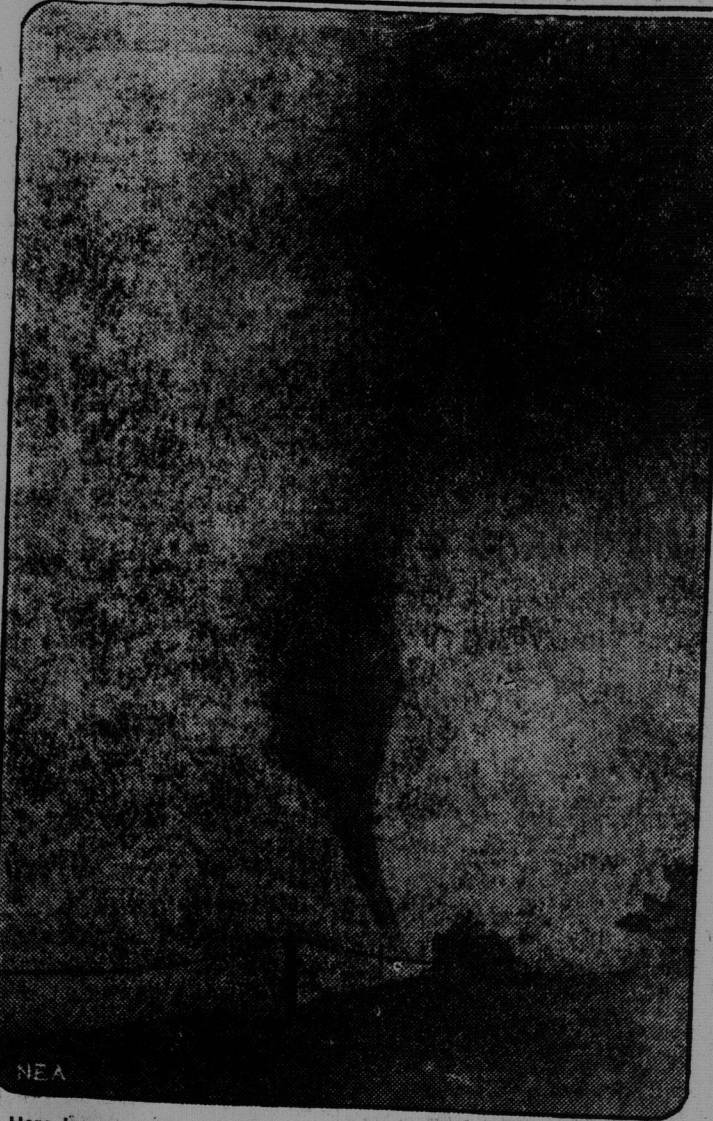

LABOR OFFICERS PAID BULK OF UNION REVENUE

Disclosure of Figures in British Commons Causes Bitter Feeling

LONDON, July 28.—The bitter feeling between the Conservatives and the Labor members in the House of Commons has been further intensified by the publication of figures showing the income and expenses, including the salaries paid to officials and the benefits paid to members, by the leading trade unions throughout the country. These figures were secured by means of parliamentary questions addressed to the Minister of Labor, in retaliation for Labor attacks upon Hon. Neville Chamberlain for holding directorships in private companies while a member of the ministry.

There was a wild uproar in the Commons when the questions were put. J. H. Thomas, in particular, made vigorous protests declaring that the questions had been put with an ulterior object. The figures published show very heavy managerial expenses compared with the income of the unions. In the case of the Transport General Workers' Union, £188,419 was spent on officials' salaries out of an income of £242,782, while only £60,302 was paid in benefits. The National Union of Railwaymen of which J. H. Thomas is the head spent £201,973 in salaries out of an income of only £241,738 while the Amalgamated Engineering Union with its double that income only spent £36,774. These figures are regarded as reflecting seriously upon Mr. Thomas' administration of the Railway Union.

COAST DRY HEAD IS INDICTED AS A RUM EMBEZZLER

United States Grand Jury Returns Ten Counts Against Col. N. M. Green

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., July 28.—A Federal grand jury here returned an indictment against Colonel N. M. Green, deposed several days ago as prohibition administrator for northern California and Nevada after being in session only three and one-half hours. The charges brought against Colonel Green were that he had misappropriated governmentally controlled liquor and had been guilty of misconduct in office.

All of the counts embodied in the indictment charged Green with the embezzlement of government property. United States District Judge Frank H. Kerrigan, who accepted the jury's return, fixed the bail at \$5,000. The amount immediately was posted by a representative of a bonding company. The indictment contained ten counts. Each count charged a violation of Section 87 of the internal revenue law, in that Colonel Green, while a Federal official, embezzled and converted to his own use whisky and assorted liquors authorized to sell HEM-ROID with guarantee that it will be as stated or money back. Several counts listed the embezzlement of one or two bottles of liquor. The largest embezzlement charged was ten bottles of whisky, one bottle of wine and one bottle of gin, alleged to have been taken June 5 last. The case against Colonel Green moved quickly. It was but a few days ago that United States District Attorney George Hatfield announced that the retired army officer was under fire. Last Friday Green admitted to interviewers that he kept a store of liquor in his hotel room and showed them a choice collection of vintages, which later was seized by internal revenue agents. The next day he was suspended on orders from Washington. Colonel Green, while admitting that he drank and served liquor to guests in his room, declared he had not violated the Volstead law, but had done all he could to gain it a wide respect by "smashing liquor at the source."
