Princess To Visit Papyrus.

London, Sept. 19.—Papyrus is to have a royal visitor after the great thoroughbred goes aboard the Aquitania Friday preparatory to sailing the next day for New York for his race with the King of the American three-year-olds, says the Daily Mail.

Princess Beatrice, aunt of King George, is to inspect the line on that day and will take the opportunity to see the famous horse in his air cushioned stall.

Meanwhile, Papyrus' trainer has been to Southampton to inspect the accommodations prepared to insure the racer's safety.

He suggested only minor alterations, most of which have to do with ventilation. A movable hatch will be put in between the stalls of Papyrus and his stable mate Bargold, "so that they can have a chat," as the trainer put it.

New York, Sept. 19.—Jimmy Goodrich, Buffalo, lightweight, won the decision over Alex Hart, of Lorrain, Ohio, at the end of a 15 round bout here last night.

Firpo To Montreal.

Tom Duggan, managing director of the Mount Royal Arena, announced yesterday that he has arranged to have Luis Angel Firpo appear there on Sept. 26. He will box six rounds with Elyear Rioux, a French Canadian, who was some of Dempsey's sparring partners.

Leonard-Dundee Bout Off.

A proposed lightweight championship bout between Benny Leonard and Johnny Dundee, which was scheduled to be held in the Yankee stadium on Sept. 28, has been called off owing to the lateness of the season.

Commission Will Not Interfere.

At a meeting of the New York State Athletic Commission yesterday no action was taken concerning complaints against Referee Johnny Gallagher because it is said he neglected to compel Dempsey to follow instructions during the recent championship bout. Miss Wehselau

Sets Two New Swim Records

Honolulu Girl Covers 100 Yards in 1.02 4-5, 220 in 2:47 4-5.

New York, Sept. 19.—Miss Mariechen Wehselau, noted water queen of the Outrigger Canoe Club, of Honolulu, is credited with two striking record performances in free style swimming. At a recent meet in the sixty-foot pool of the Honolulu Y. M. C. A. she covered 100 yards in 1.02 4-5, the fastest century ever achieved by a member of her sex, and she turned 220 yards in 2:47 4-5, a new standard for a short pool.

The best previous performances under the conditions, 1:05 and 2:50 1-8 respectively, are claimed for Miss Gertrude Ederle, of the Women's Swimming Association of New York, and are of this season's making, but it should be mentioned that Miss Ederle set the mark for the longer distance on the way to 600 yards and has done the furling in 2:46 4-5 in a seventy-five foot pool.

Particular interest is attached to the remarkable exploits of the Hawaiian champion, and Miss Ederle is slated for a visit to the islands and will meet Miss Wehselau in matches at 100, 220 and 440 yards in a three-day water carnival in Honolulu, starting October 10. Stirring competition seems assured.

Crew Leaps From Blazing Speed Boat

Owner and Driver Forced into Water During Power Boat Regatta.

Buffalo, Sept. 19.—Robert Ringling of Chicago, owner and driver of Virolog II, and his mechanic, Louis Ehrig, were forced to desert their craft and jump for their lives when the speeding boat caught fire at the ninth mile of the free-for-all sweepstakes of the international power boat regatta in the last heat on the Niagara River. Ringling and Ehrig dived from the cockpit when the flames swept over the prow, and Virolog II, running uncontrolled, nearly collided with Delphine, the yacht of Horace E. Dodge, Detroit. Other craft on the

river pursued and captured Virolog and dragged it to the bank, where it burned to the water's edge.

Musketier I, owned and driven by Horace E. Dodge, Detroit, won the International Great Lakes Championship trophy in the free-for-all sweepstakes. Musketier I took the final heat in 42 minutes, 44 seconds for the thirty miles, amassing 26 points. Bone Dry, property of Clarence Sidway, Buffalo, was second in the final heat and second in the race with 53 points. Belle Isle Bearcat, E. M. Gregory, Detroit, was third with 17 points, but Sayonara, Addison Vars, Buffalo, nosed out Gregory's entry for third place in the last heat.

65,000 See Milton Set World Record

Lowers Time for 100 Miles on Dirt by 13 Min., 36 Sec.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 19.—More than 65,000 persons saw Tommy Milton set a new world's automobile racing speed record for 100 miles on a dirt track at the New York State Fair, the winner of the Indianapolis 500-mile race this

year making the distance over the one-mile track in 1 hour 15 minutes 88 seconds. The former record was 1 hour 29 minutes 9 seconds, made by Eddie Hearne at Phoenix, Ariz. in 1919.

Taking the lead early from Harry Harts, who finished second at Indianapolis, Milton held it through to the end and finished two miles ahead of Harts, who was second. Ira Vail was third, Ralph de Palma fourth and Eddie Hearne fifth.

Milton's victory brought to him the American championship for the distance on a dirt track and a cash prize of \$5,000. Harts and Vail finished well ahead of the former record.

George Melanson, a six year old boy was playing in the street and ran in front of the car. Dr. A. E. Logie put two stitches in a wound on the boy's head.
