

# PAUSED SCARE IN ATLANTIC CITY

Bullets in Dry-War Passed Over Boardwalk and Strollers Scattered to Shelter.

Atlantic City, N. J., June 20.—A fleet of high-speed cruisers supposed to be gun runners, was completely routed a few days ago by a local Coast Guard boat whose crew made use of rifles and pistols. Small arms were used by the coast guardmen because their craft is not yet equipped with heavier guns such as have been furnished to all the revenue cutters operating out of New York City.

In the course of the chase in which the bootleggers, apparently were unwilling or unable in their haste to return the fire, a hundred shots are estimated to have been fired by the members of the Coast Guard. Bullets whizzed over the boardwalk, and late strollers hurried to shelter. The chase of the gun-runners and the fight began within 200 yards of the boardwalk, and many persons alleged today that their lives were endangered by the promiscuous shooting of the members of the Coast Guard.

Persons who accidentally became the target of stray bullets made angry protests today to Congressman Isaac Bacharach of this district. They went to his house and his office to express their indignation at the indiscriminate shooting alleged to have been done by the members of the Coast Guard.

The rout of the liquor smugglers occurred at a place between the Hotel Pavillion and the Royal Palace Hotel. In the gloom the members of the Coast Guard who went out on patrol under command of Captain John Holdson, head of the Atlantic City Coast Guards, strained their eyes in the direction from whence came the soft purring of a high-power motor such as are used in the latest type speed boats of the smugglers in the rum trade.

## Lightning Reveals Cruisers.

Suddenly the skies were reft with flashes of lightning, which disclosed a fleet of about five powerful cruisers. The three boats of the Coast Guard began a circling movement after signaling to the suspects to halt.

Instead of answering the command the speedboats headed out to sea. A single shot was fired by one of the men aboard a cutter, but the shot was ignored by the gun-runners. Then the members of the Coast Guard cut loose with all their rifles and pistols. The fugitives did not turn back under the hail of fire, but kept straight ahead and were quickly concealed in a heavy fog bank that did not lift until after the storm had swept over Atlantic City.

The residents of the inlet who complained of the alleged erratic shooting by the members of the Coast Guard were led by Harry Hackney, one of the best-known restaurateurs of the resort.

"The matter has been placed before Congressman Bacharach," said Hackney after he and other property owners had registered their protest. "The men in the Government boats can't even row a boat, and know much less about the art of aiming a rifle."

"The rum boats were less than 100 yards away from the coast guard boats, and I don't think one of the bullets fired found its mark. Nine out of every ten shots were fired towards the boardwalk and in our direction. If the Government men go further out to sea and not endanger the lives of peace abiding citizens and visitors who are out for pleasure, or persons asleep in their homes."

Investigation Is Under Way. Captain Holdson, head of the Coast Guard Station at Atlantic City, was reticent when questioned about the naval engagement off the boardwalk. He admitted that an investigation was under way, but would not admit that any boats were recognized or that warrants were to be issued for the arrest of any one suspected of bootlegging.

"No one was hurt among the coast guards," said Captain Holdson. "I do not know whether anybody was injured aboard the liquor boats."

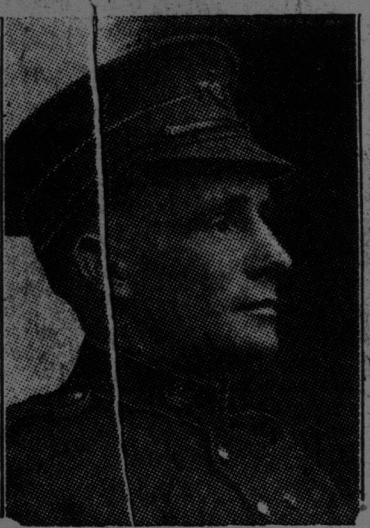

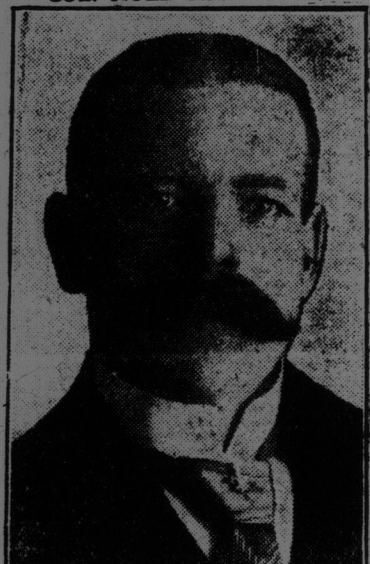
