

CALL TO CHURCH FOR LEADERSHIP

Home and Various Phases of
Public Life.

Addresses at Methodist Epis-
copal Conference—Restore
Home Standards—Criticism
of "The New Feminism."

Detroit, Nov. 12.—A challenge to the church to assume the leadership in the home and in various phases of public life was sounded by speakers here yesterday at the National Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church. Bishop Howard H. Hughes of Boston, in summing up the results of the three-day meeting, declared work of the centenary movement had only begun.

"The present hour must be a new Calvary, where once again we will take up the burden of the Cross and Christianize the world," he said.

Declaring the American home is disintegrating under the influence of "the new feminism," Rev. Fred. W. Adams of Springfield, Mass., made a plea for changes in home life. "We do not want the old Puritanism to return," he said, "but we do desire that the standards in the home that prevailed during the country's infancy be remodeled to meet the needs of this day."

"The new feminism is drawing the best of our womanhood from marriage and motherhood, while loose ideals on the permanence of marriage are being imported by Russian barefoot dancers. The hand that stops rocking the cradle begins to rock the boat of our family life."



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
