AIM TO LOWER FREIGHT RATES

Transportation Committee of
the House Reports After
Stormy Sessions—Tory
Members Quit.

Ottawa, June 25.—After stormy ses-
sions lasting throughout the day and in-
to the evening of Saturday, the special
committee on transportation costs
decided, by a vote of sixteen to one on
its report to the house. In brief, the
committee recommends:
(1)—Suspension of the Crow's Nest
Pass agreement, except in respect to
grain and flour, for one year from July
1, 1922, with power to the cabinet to
suspend for another year by order-in-
council, if then existing conditions jus-
tify such action.
(2)—Crow's Nest rates on grain and
flour to apply from July 1 (the date
when suspension of the Crow's Nest
agreement expires).
(3)—That the best efforts of railway

TO DAM THE JORDAN

AT SEA OF GALILEE

Material Bought from Ger-
man Firms at Half Cost of
Other Tenderers.

Jerusalem, June 26.—(Associated
Press)—Much of the material that is
to be used in the work of developing the
hydraulic power of the falls of the Jordan,
near the Sea of Galilee, will be ac-
quired from German firms. Their prices
are said to be one-half those of British
houses and considerably below those of
U. S. bidders.

The plan includes the construction of
a dam on the Jordan River at the point
where it issues from the Sea of Galilee;
a large storage reservoir; irrigation canals,
and the installation of electric gen-
erating stations. American-Jewish or-
ganizations are said to be largely inter-
ested in the project.

The contract has been awarded to
Pinhas Rutenberg, a Russian engineer,
by the British government. Mr. Ruten-
berg is now in the United States, seeking
financial support for the project. The
work will involve an expenditure of \$10-

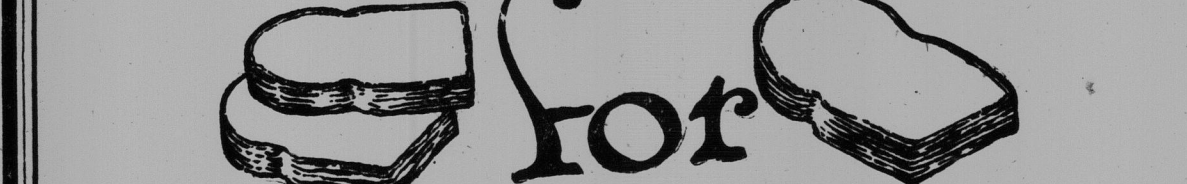
